The Blection.

The fall result in the State is not known as yet. The returns arrive slowly and bring no particular discomfort. Democratic successes are the rule, and Republican, Independent and National successes the exception. Independentism in North Carolina hasn't hurt very bad this time. Both houses will be strongly Democratic over all. The Senate is composed of fifty members, and as far as heard from there is a clear Democratic majority of eight; while in the House, which has one hundred and twenty members, the result, as ascertained, gives sixteen Democratic majority. The Senate and the House together will therefore give a Democratic majority on joint ballot of twentyfour, with eight districts and twenty-six counties to hear from. Yet we can safely count, we think, ou a clear Democratic majority on joint ballot of at least forty, which is enough for all practical pur-

It is true that the opposition of Radicals and Independents has b en a very strenuous one; but now that the fight is over and the result has been known, it cannot be regretted. Some very good names are lost to the list of Senators and Representatives, but it was not to be exticket under any circumstances. We think that the Democratic party of the State-and we speak now of the unadulterated article, the Simon-pure Democracy-have great cause for self gratulations on the happy result.

Cinders in the Bye. Persons travelling much by railway are subject to continual annoyance from the flying cinders. Meeting of the Board of Magistrates for New Hanover County,

In accordance with Section 5, Chapter 141, laws of 1876-'7, which requires the board of Justices to meet at the Court House on the first Monday in August for the election of County Commissioners, the board of Justices was called to order this morning at 11 o'clock, Justice John S. James in the Chair. The roll being called thirty one Magistrates answered to their names. The regular order of business was then proceeded with, when the report of the committee appointed to inquire into the matter of abolishing the office of County Treasurer by the Chairman, D. G. Worth, together with the written opinion of Mr. Solicitor Moore in regard to the increase of the Sheriff's bond in the event that the Board decided to abolish the

office referred to above, was made. The report recommended that the resolution now pending before the board abolishing the office of County Treasurer be for the present withdrawn and that this board petition the Legislature at its next session to pass such laws as will enable the county authorities to require sufficient bonds from the Sheriff and other County officers for the faithful collection and disbursement of all funds that may come into their hands from whatever source. The report was unanimously adopted.

The Chairman then announced the next business in order was the election o County Commissioners.

On motion of Justice Myers the number was fixed at five.

On motion of Justice Meares it was Resolved. That in the election of County Commissioners by the Justices of the eace, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice.

Numerous nominations were then made. The chair announced as tellers Justices Myers, Cantwell and McQuigg, and the Board proceeded to ballot. On the first ballot Col. Wm. L. Smith received 23 votes, B. G. Worth 19, Horace A. Bagg 18, Jas. A. Montgomery 18, and A. J. Grady 17, which being a majority of all the votes cast, the above-named gentlemen were declared duly elected County Commissioners for the ensuing two years. Justice J. N. Maffitt then offered the

following resolution, which was unanimonsly adopted: Be it resolved, by the Board of County

Magistrates, that the Secretary of the Board be voted a compensation of fifty dollars for his valuable and untiring attention to his various duties, and that the County Commissioners be hereby authorized to pay to the Secretary the amount herein stipulated in this resolu-

After the passage of the above resoluution, upon motion the Board adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.
