THE FALL TRADE.

There are many encouraging signs ahead of more prosperous times this Fall, that is, if we may take plainly expressed newspaper opinions as indications.

Our trade reports within the few days past, it is gratifying to be enabled to say, have borne testimony to a hopeful feeling among about all classes of merchants as to the Fall trade, and the feeling is supported by many substantial facts which speak for themselves.

As in this country so in England does the prospect seem to improve and the indications are brightening, as evidence of which we make a short extract here from an article which appeared in the London Times of the 2d inst.

The people of Grenada, in the goodness of their hearts, refused to close their hospitable doors against the refugees from New Orleans and other infected ports, and the consequence is the terrible results depicted in the telegrams from the Chief Marshal of Grenada, the only surviving municipal officer of that corporation, to Governor Vance, and also to our Mayor, both of which were published in yesterday's REVIEW.

God grant that the poor, afflicted people may find speedy relief from the terrible scourge they are suffering and a speedy response to all of their appeals for help.
