

RESISTANCE TO THE AUSTRIANS.

One Division Forced to Retreat - Panславism at the Bottom of the Insurrection.

VIENNA, August 14.—Wartenburg's and Tegobloff's divisions of Jovanovich's corps are expected to enter Sarajivo on Thursday or Friday next, without opposition, the inhabitants having already given notice of their submission to the Austrian occupation. Gen. Szpary's check before Tuzla was due to the numerical superiority of the insurgents. The Austrians spiked two of their own guns and abandoned them. The engagements with the insurgents were very obstinate.

The New Free Press confirms the statement that the basis for an arrangement between Austria and the Porte has already been agreed upon. The Press says that a treaty will be signed at Sarajivo by Gen. Philippovich and Mehmet Ali Pasha.

HOWARD'S PURSUIT ENDED.

Telegraphing that the Hostile Indians are Assembling to Surrender.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Gen. McDowell forwards the following despatch from Gen. Howard, dated Boise City, Idaho, Aug. 12: "Reports from Capt. Miller of the 10th inst. indicate scattered parties of hostiles assembling to surrender. Some are wandering, but few appear together south of Harney. The few Weiser Indians have gone into the rough country between the Weiser and the Snake rivers. Major Egbert, near Cold Springs overland stage road, ran upon six or seven Indians, and captured from them fifteen horses, Greene, with five companies, is pushing those who have fled east and north from Camas prairie. Forsyth was yesterday at Camp 'Three Forks,' and Miles' mounted infantry is scouting different places from Baker to the mouth of the Boise river. Capt. Damm, with the Lpswai and Mount Idaho men, starts for home up the trail through the Indian valley. I have instructed and rearranged the force, putting Forsyth in charge here, Miles at Baker, Wheaton at Walla Walla, and reinforcing Miller at Malheur Agency, sending him with prisoners to Harney, having also taken the necessary preliminary steps to send the troops to their new stations as soon as we can judiciously do so. I will start for Vancouver to-day."

GEN. BUTLER'S CANDIDACY.

A Circular that is Being Disturbing Among the Voters of Massachusetts.

Boston, Aug. 14.—Hundreds of copies of the following document were printed to-day and are being presented by Gen. Butler's friends to the voters in every city and town: To GEN. BENJAMIN F. BUTLER—Dear Sir: We, the undersigned, legal voters of the _____, feeling the necessity of a more economical administration of our State Government as well as of our national affairs, and believing you would, if elected Governor of our State, use your experience, influence and skill in public affairs to relieve the people's burdens, and with your great energy bring about a more equal and efficient administration of the laws of this Commonwealth, would most respectfully ask the privilege of using your name as an independent candidate for the office of Chief Magistrate of our State.

Fayetteville Gazette: Mr. Shaffer, the miller at Merchants' Mill, had a narrow escape from drowning on last Tuesday evening. He went out on the dam to remove some boards, when he lost his balance and fell into the pond. The water was irresistible and carried him over the dam, a height of some 25 feet. He was stunned by the fall, and was taken out in a half-drowned condition by passers-by. We are glad to say that he was not seriously injured.

ANOTHER CORRUPT INDIAN AGENT.

Proved Guilty of Swearing to False Pay Rolls and Embezzlement.

BISMARCK, D. T., Aug. 14.—Gen. Hammond, Indian Inspector, has found another corrupt agent at Fort Berthold agency, above Bismarck. He is not a big thief, but is proved a reverend backslider of the Congregational Church, who has been guilty of perjury in swearing to false pay rolls, and of embezzlement in pocketing funds drawn on a voucher belonging to another man. He carried his wife on his pay roll when she was absent from the agency, and has lied and acted so cowardly toward the Indians that they unanimously yell for his official scalp. He is a wretched sample of a wretched line of church agents. The records of Agents Sperry and Tappan, preceding Aiden, are missing. They have bad reputations.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Information has been received at the Indian Office that 1,500 pounds of tobacco have been found secreted under the floor of the issue house at the Crow Creek Agency. Livingstone reported that there were but 3,000 pounds at the agency. Eight thousand pounds have already been discovered. This is more than an eighth of the whole amount issued annually to all the Indians in the United States. It is not known whether Livingstone applied for additional supplies of tobacco this year, but he did make application for the usual amount of drugs when he had enough on hand to last for fifteen years.

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Fayetteville Gazette: We regret to learn that the stable and forge house of Maj. Jno. Evans, east of the Cape Fear River, was struck by lightning last Sunday afternoon, and the building, with all its contents, destroyed. No insurance. Raleigh News: Mr. Foster, of Franklin, the inventor of the type-setting machine of which much mention has been made, has at last perfected one, and has had orders for the right of large sums. The machine is the result of long years of labor.

Raleigh News: Mr. J. P. Tucker, of Halifax county, has sent the Department of Agriculture a beet that can't be beaten. It is of the blood-red turnip variety, and weighs 18 pounds. It will be exhibited at the Fair as the largest ever grown in the State.

Tarboro Southerner: A military company has just been formed at Ringwood, Halifax county, with the following glorious veterans as officers: Col. F. M. Parker, Captain; J. P. Leach, 1st Lieutenant; H. C. Matthews, 2nd Lieutenant; B. F. Arrington, 3rd Lieutenant.

Greensboro Patriot: Turkey feathers are coming into demand in the Northern markets. A gentleman from Richmond informs us that they will bring from 20 to 30 cents per pound in that city. They must be plucked dry. There is demand for all feathers of three inches or more in length, except the wing feathers.

Raleigh Observer: The Secretary of State informs us that all the counties have sent in the official abstracts of the late election except Rockingham. He has written to the proper authorities there to send down the returns, so that there will be no necessity for an adjournment of the Board of State Canvassers.

Fayetteville Gazette: Mr. Thos. H. Sutton, in a communication in this week's issue, makes grave charges against the mail agent on the Cape Fear river. The writer's character and standing forbids the idea that he would make an accusation lightly, and if the statements made are true the mail agent should be removed for incompetency or carelessness, or both.

Goldsboro Messenger: It is with regret that we chronicle the removal of Prof. E. W. Adams and his esteemed family from our midst. The Professor has located in the town of Wilson where he assumes charge of a male school under most flattering auspices. We wish him success in his new field of labor, and congratulate the good people of Wilson on having secured his services.

Charlotte Observer: Yesterday afternoon Sandy Patterson, a fireman on one of the passenger engines on the North Carolina Railroad, in cleaning off the engine, accidentally turned one of the cocks attached to a pipe leading into the boiler, when the hot water and steam rushed out upon him, and before he could escape one of his legs was badly scalded. It is feared that the burn extended a considerable distance into the flesh, and if so the fireman will be disabled for several weeks.

The General was in town on Tuesday en route for Smithfield, from which point he intends to make an inspection of the river down to Goldsboro, and the survey ordered by Congress will be begun with early frost; it not being deemed expedient to undertake it now.
