THE BANKRUPT LAW.

As the repeal of the bankrupt actakes effect on the first of next month. now little more than a week distant, those who have not yet taken the benefit of this act and who may propose to do so, should be in a hurry about it. The following facts hearing upon bankruptcy will be of interest:

"A bankrupt is not required to pay any proportion of his debts con-Messrs. Eberstein of Dresden, Saxony, tracted before January 1, 1869, nor any of those in which he is liable as security for others. The law requires that his assets shall be equal to thirty per centum of the claims-which his creditors shall go to the cost and trouble of proving in legal formagainst his estate, and upon which he shall be liable as principal debtor, and which were contracted since the 1st day of January, 1869. Bankrupts without assets can, however, be discharged by obtaining the assent of one-fourth in number and one-third in value of their creditors who have cases it is very rare that any debts are proved; in which event the bankrupt can obtain his discharge at any time Saratoga life has been studied this sea- after sixty days from the filing of the court show that there is not one bankrupt in a hundred who is not entitled to his discharge. Merchants are hereby notified that a privilege tax was levied by the last Legislature of Five Dollars (the same levied by county) in addition to the Schedule Taxes proper.
Wholesale dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases, the law now compels payment on all purchases made within the State as well as out of the State, including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits of turpentine, rosin and naval stores of any kind, and cotton, also wood and coal dealers All Hotels, Boarding Houses, Restaurant and Eating Houses are required by law to pay one-half per cent on gross receipts. The tax will be due July 1st., and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the first of January, 1878.
