THE CONGRESSIONAL CAMPAIGN.

As has already been announced by us, the Congressional campaign in this district will open here on Tuesday evening next, on which occasion Hon. A. M. Waddell, our candidate, will address his fellow-citizens at the intersection of Front and Market streets.

Notwithstanding the talk to the contrary, we do not believe that there will be any organized opposition to Col. Waddell's election. The Republicans, as a party, are too weak, and the only chance for them is an alliance with the Greenbackers, which we do not think can be effected.

The pretext is too thin for the object not to be apparent at the first glance. Col. Waddell has too many friends among those Democrats, who have been induced to enter into the new party, and his views on finances are too well known to allow of dissatisfaction with them.

THE BANKRUPT LAW.

As the repeal of the bankrupt act takes effect on the first of next month, now little more than a week distant, those who have not yet taken the benefit of this act and who may propose to do so, should be in a hurry about it.

A bankrupt is not required to pay any proportion of his debts contracted before January 1, 1869, nor any of those in which he is liable as security for others. The law requires that his assets shall be equal to thirty per centum of the claims.

The records of the bankrupt court show that there is not one bankrupt in a hundred who is not entitled to his discharge. The bankrupt is entitled to a homestead exemption of \$2,000 as against debts contracted since the 6th day of July, 1869.
