

LATEST REPORTS OF THE FEVER.

Fifty-Eight Deaths in New Orleans—Thirty-Seven New Cases in Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 22.—The fever is on the increase, thirty-seven new cases being reported from 5 o'clock yesterday evening to noon to-day.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 22.—Much alarm was produced last evening in the northeastern portion of the city by a reported case of yellow fever.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Aug. 22.—The citizens here have made a handsome contribution for the sufferers in Grenada and New Orleans.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 22.—A bale of new cotton, the first of the season, from some point in Mississippi, was sold on 'Change this noon for \$1,153.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 22.—The committee appointed by the St. John's Church collected and telegraphed to Memphis over \$400 for the benefit of the fever sufferers.

COLUMBUS, Ga., Aug. 22.—The Eagle and Phoenix Factory Company here have authorized eight drafts for \$200 for New Orleans yellow fever sufferers.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 22.—A meeting of citizens to take measures for raising funds in aid of the yellow fever sufferers took place at the Mayor's office to-day.

PORT ROYAL, S. C., Aug. 22.—Port Royal is in good sanitary condition. There has been no sickness here.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22.—The Howard Association has received from Port Gibson application for eight nurses.

PORT SAID, S. A., Aug. 22.—New cases, 1; deaths, 1; total cases to date, 53; deaths, 8.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—All money packages received at the Treasury Department from the yellow fever districts are, by direction of the Treasurer, disinfected by the use of carbolic acid.

MOBILE, Ala., Aug. 22.—The Mobile Life Insurance Company to-day telegraphed the Mayors of Vicksburg and Grenada to draw for \$100 each in aid of the sick.
