Fifty-Eight Deaths in New Orleans-2.Thirty-Seven New Cases in Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 22-The fe ver is on the increase, thirty-seven new cases being reported from 5 o'clock yesterday evening to noon to-day. But there is a smaller number of deaths than for the same period yesterday. Among the new cases this morning is that of Dr. John C. Rogers, and among the dead Henry Schultz and T. A. Cloyd. Reports from Senatobia, Miss., this morning, are to the effect that five cases of fever have been developed there. The people are panic-stricken, sixty fam.lies moving out last evening.

New Orleans, Aug. 22-There are reported to-day 88 new cases from vellow fever.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug 22-Much alarm was produced last evening in the northeastern portion of the city by a reported case of yellow fever. The health officer , promptly visited the premises, and reports merely a case of malarial fever in the fami y of more than a month ago, and who had recently returned from Philadelphia. The city was never more healthy than now, but notwithstanding this, the health authorities are engaged in removing all possible sources of disease, and disinfecting alleys and other uncleau places.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Aug. 22 .- The citizens here have made a handsome contribution for the sufferers in Grenada and New Orleans. This city is unusually healthy, and keeps up the strictest quarantine against infected places.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 22 .-- A bale of new cotton, the first of the season, from some point in M:ssissippi, was sold on 'Change this moon for \$1,155, and the amount has been despatched South to aid fever-stricken cities, Evans, Lippincott & Conningham, and Charles Kahn, provision dealers, have instructed the authorities of Memphis and New Orleans to draw on yellow fever sufferers.
