Col. Waddell at Burgaw.

The largest assembly of persons that ever gathered together in Pender county met at Burgaw yesterday to hear that popular speaker, distinguished gentleman and eminent statesman, Hon. A. M. Waddell, our candidate for reelection to Congress.

He was introduced in a neat and graceful manner by Dr. W. T. Ennett, member of the Congressional Executive Committee for Pender county, referring to his past record and distinguished services, and to his being so highly appreciated not only throughout the State, but elsewhere as well.

He opposed national banks, advocated greenbacks, and declared himself the best Greenbacker in the county, because he had voted for them "and proof of the pudding was in the bag."

He next alluded to the manner in which we were cheated out of our President. He referred to the Board to decide the matter, acknowledged he voted for it, because he thought the Supreme Court Judges would act honestly, but found to his disgust and chagrin that they were corrupt.

He spoke encouragingly of the railroad from Burgaw to Jacksonville, and said he trusted they would get it through, as it would redound to their benefit and to that of their posterity.

He concluded amid deafening applause after which three rousing cheers were given for Hon. A. M. Waddell, for which he cordially thanked them all.

Wilmington—Its Business Prospects.

An examination of the "comparative statement of stocks, receipts and exports," which was published in yesterday's REVIEW, gives a favorable showing for the business of this port.

In the five great staples of cotton, spirits of turpentine, rosin, tar and crude turpentine the export of the past year amounted to over \$7,250,000, and adding to that sum the value of the amount now in stocks we have here a commercial value of these articles which amounts to considerably over \$7,500,000.

In making our estimate we have endeavored to keep as near average prices as possible, and we are confident that we have placed the figures too low in some instances, as we prefer not to exaggerate.

We have had no time to examine the files and thus give perfect accuracy, but have been guided in our effort by a desire to give a fair and just average value to each article.

In the exhibit cotton is yet king, showing a value of over \$5,500,000, (\$1,000,000 more than the estimated value of real estates in the city of Wilmington) while spirits of turpentine came next with a value of over \$1,000,000.

The "statement" is also valuable and interesting as showing the increase of receipts at this port over previous years, illustrating the fact that our excellent railroad facilities are being appreciated and utilized, and that the traffic which has heretofore sought other terminals localities for shipment, is now being brought to Wilmington.

The commercial season of 1877-78 has certainly been the poorest and most cheerless of any during the past decade, but Wilmington has no good reason to feel despondent.

She has struggled through the difficulties of the year, and in spite of financial stagnation she shows an increase of business over previous and more prosperous years.

Improvements.

Mr. A. B. Cook is having erected on the corner of Front and Castle streets, a two story frame building in which he proposes to run a grocery, bar, beer garden and a fresh meat stand.

Petition of Alexander Oldham, in reference to certain disorderly proceedings on Nutt street, &c., was ordered referred to the Chairman of the Board, with the request that he examine into the alleged facts therein stated and report at the next meeting of the Board.

The Board then took a recess until 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, the 3d inst. this evening.

Diphtheria at Town Creek.

We are truly sorry to learn that the diphtheria is raging fearfully at Town Creek, in Brunswick county. Sunday last there were five deaths in that neighborhood, the area covered being only about three miles square.

County Commissioners.

The Board met yesterday afternoon in regular monthly session.

The Chairman made a statement to the effect that, in keeping with the requirements of the law, it devolved upon the Board to go into the election of a Chairman of the Board, the term of the present Chairman having expired August 31st.

On motion of Col. John W. Atkinson, the former Chairman, Jno. G. Wagner, Esq., was by unanimous consent continued the Chairman of the Board.

Stacey VanAmringe presented his official bond in the sum of \$10,000, as Clerk of the Superior Court of New Hanover county, with Messrs. George Chidbourn, F. W. Foster and W. S. Pridden as sureties, who justified to amounts aggregating \$2,500 over and above the sum required, which was ordered accepted, and that the same be registered on the records of official bonds.

Mr. VanAmringe thereupon appeared before the Board and qualified in accordance with the requirements of law.

S. H. Manning tendered his official bond in the sum of \$25,000, as Sheriff of New Hanover County, but there being objections made as to the validity of the bond, on motion, it was ordered that the acceptance of the same be deferred to a subsequent meeting of the Board.

E. D. Hewlett, Coroner elect for the county of New Hanover, presented his official bond in the sum of \$2,000, which was, on motion, ordered accepted, and that the same be registered on the records of official bonds, whereupon Mr. Hewlett appeared and duly qualified.

Joseph E. Sampson, Register of Deeds elect for the county of New Hanover, presented his official bond in the sum of \$5,000, with B. G. Bates and James Wilson as sureties, which was, on motion, ordered accepted, and that the same be entered upon the record of official bonds, whereupon he came forward and was duly qualified.

An application of Thomas Monk, of Harnett Township, was received, whereupon it was ordered that all the hands living on each side of the Newbern road, subject to road duty, be assigned to Thomas Monk, overseer of the public road known as the Old Plank Road, and that the Newbern road is to be kept up without any lawful road hands.

It was ordered that as the tax books are all completed, and having been presented to this Board by Mr. M. Cronly, the same be accepted, and that the Clerk of the Board receipt for said books.

Elijah Hewlett, County Treasurer elect for New Hanover county, was granted two weeks in which to furnish his bond, as requested by him, and the same be required on Monday, the 16th of the present month, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Board of Aldermen.

The regular monthly session of the Board was held yesterday afternoon.

Petition of W. B. McKoy, asking permission to extend a wooden building, situated on Market, between Second and Third streets, and which was referred to the Committee on Fire Department at the last regular meeting, was, on the recommendation of said committee, granted.

Petition of C. Stemmermann, asking permission to erect a two-story frame building on the Southeast corner of Third and Nun streets, was, on the recommendation of the Committee on Fire Department, granted.

Petition from sundry citizens, asking that a 400 barrel cistern be built at the corner of Seventh and Wooster streets, and which was referred to the committee on Fire Department at the last regular meeting, on the recommendation of said committee was not granted.

Petition of Mott & Campen, presented at the last regular meeting, was withdrawn.

The following was adopted: Resolved, the Board of Audit and Finance concurring, That all parties paying their taxes in cash for the year 1878, on or before October 15th, 1878, shall be allowed a deduction of five per cent; all paying from October 16th to December 15th, a deduction of two and a half per cent; and on all taxes unpaid on December 15th interest shall be charged at the rate of eight per cent per annum.

The committee on Market and Fees, to whom was referred the resolution establishing certain limits for market carts, asked for further time to report, which was granted.

Alderman Foster introduced the following, which was referred to the Finance Committee: Resolved, That the City Clerk and Treasurer shall have noted upon the stub of each tax receipt given for taxes on real and personal property, the amount of said taxes received in money and the amount received in city coupons.

Also, that the City Clerk and Treasurer shall purchase city coupons with funds on hand or deposit over and above—dollars required for the city government on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month.

Also, that all sealed proposals offering past due city coupons for payment, shall be opened on the above named dates, in his office, at 12 o'clock M., in the presence of all who may be present, and in the presence of at least one of the Committee of Finance.

Also, that a record of the names, post-office address, and the amount of coupons held, shall be kept of all parties offering coupons, and rate of discount that may be stated.

Also, that the most favorable terms offered to the city shall be accepted. Also, that no moneys shall be paid out of the City Treasury for city coupons other wise than as above expressed.

Alderman Foster offered the following which was adopted: Resolved, That His Honor, Mayor Fishblate, have the usual publication made, asking for bids for furnishing the city with gas or other material for the street lamps, bids to be for one and five years from expiration of present contract with the Wilmington Gas Company; the bids to be for each lamp by the year; the bids to be based upon what is known as four and six feet burners, the same to be received by His Honor on or before the next regular meeting, the first Monday in October, when said bids will be opened and considered, the Board of Aldermen having the option to reject bids for sufficient causes.

Alderman Hill offered the following resolution, which was referred to the committee on Market and Fees: Resolved, That all persons, other than city wood dealers, bringing wood to this market, when the same is sold by retail, be taxed the sum of ten cents per cord for each and every cord sold. The same to take effect from and after the 1st of October, 1878.

Caused by Colored Hose.
