The Charlotte Observer talks of a new cotton factory to be erected in Gaston county, which is to be run by steam, which will be, with one exception, the only steam cotton factory in the State. The exception referred to is probably the cotton mills now in operation here.

The lyre was the gift of a lady of this city who wished to contribute her mite to the relief of the plague-ridden people of the South and West. Six dollars and seventy-five cents was realized from it.

The supposition is he was drawn under the vessel.

#### An Appeal.

A home for the destitute children left orphaned and friendless by the yellow fever has been opened in Memphis. The inmates all need clothing, and some of the little ones being forced for the safety of others to have all of their clothing destroyed to prevent infection spreading in this house of refuge, are particularly helpless. An appeal has been made in their behalf, and all contributions, whether of cloth or clothing, and the latter may be new or old, will be received and forwarded by Mrs. Geo. G. Thomas, corner Fourth and Market Streets. It is desirable that the articles be forwarded as soon as possible.

#### For Memphis.

Mr. John G. Bauman, of this city, will leave here this evening for Memphis, as a volunteer nurse for those who are afflicted with the yellow fever. Mayor Fishplate has telegraphed to the Mayor of Memphis of his intended departure and Mr. Bauman will report to municipal headquarters on his arrival there.

Mr. Geo. A. A. Poppe, also of this city, will leave for Memphis, also, on Wednesday as a volunteer nurse. Both of these gentlemen have had the fever and are therefore free from any fears of the disease. We wish them both God speed in their charitable mission and hope for their safe return.

Since writing the above, we have learned that Mr. J. A. McCallum has also tendered his services and will leave for Memphis to-night or to-morrow morning. He also, if we mistake not, was down with the fever here in 1862.

#### City Court.

The first case called this morning was that of Julia Ford, colored, charged with arson. Case continued at request of defendant, until 9:30 to-morrow morning.

Sam Pickett, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was fined \$125.

Judy Ann Hunter, a poor, innocent-looking colored creature, who only puts in an appearance at the City Court about nine hundred and ninety-nine times in the course of a year, i. e., more or less, was up this morning for being drunk and disorderly, and fined \$5, or two days in the city prison.

Julia Pearson, colored, was arraigned for disorderly conduct, in that about 2:30 o'clock Sunday morning she was shouting murder from a building known as the "Long House," in the lower part of the city. Officer Goodman, who made the arrest, stated in court that the cries of murder attracted his attention, but that on entering the house he found no one but the defendant, who then told him that a man had been beating her. The man, however, had fled. The woman was arrested and locked up this morning. The Mayor dismissed the case.

One colored man, who was arrested for being drunk and down, was let off this time.

#### Workingmen's Contribution.

Some of Messrs. Williams & Murchison's hands contributed last Saturday night, out of the week's earnings, the sum of \$8 for the benefit of the fever sufferers. Mr. John G. Darden, the Foreman, gave \$2, Mr. G. W. Branch, \$1, Hampton Sanders \$1, and eight others 50 cents each.

#### A Lunatic Picked up on the Streets.

A poor fellow by the name of Geo. W. Moore, an escaped lunatic from the Poor House, was found on the street this morning without hat or coat, running around with a basket on his arm containing a few hulled peas. He was taken to the City Hall and kindly cared for until about 10 o'clock when he was delivered over to the proper authorities, who afterwards delivered him to a keeper from the Poor House.

#### The Fire Yesterday Morning.

The alarm of fire at about 3 o'clock yesterday morning came from a small wooden dwelling house on the corner of Third and Church streets, occupied by a colored woman named Eliza Lucas.

It was thought to have been incendiary as it came from the rear of the house near where a lot of lightwood for winter use was stored and when first discovered the flames were running up the lattice work on the piazza as though it had been saturated with kerosene. The Fire Department were on the spot in time to partially save the building. Part of the household effects were saved and part were lost.

A colored woman by the name of Julia Ford was arrested on the charge of having set fire to the house and the case will be heard before the Mayor to-morrow.
