Work has begun at the sturgeon fisheries, and quite a number of the monsters of the finny tribe have been slaughtered and sent to Northern markets, thus early in the season.
It is said that there were nearly 400 bales of cotton sold in this market to-day, which is the biggest day, by 100 bales, we have had this season. The receipts to-day were 619 bales.
Rev. J. R. Wilson, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in this city, arrived here last night after an absence of two months, and will fill his pulpit on Sunday next.

Military Gossip.
The Raleigh News says: Ammunition for the breech-loading rifles has been shipped to all the companies of the State Guard which will be present at Encampment. Rules for rifle-practice, together with complete score books, have also been distributed. In future great attention will be paid to rifle-practice, as it is desired that the troops may become efficient marksmen.
There are now 27 white infantry companies and 10 colored; two batteries of light artillery, both white. The total of the force, officers and enlisted men, is about 2,300.
Charleston Jetties.
Messrs. M. L. Dolbey and Eli T. Bangs, the contractors, to whom has been awarded the job of building the jetties, have arrived in Charleston and registered at the Pavilion Hotel. These gentlemen stated that they will commence the work at an early day. The steam tug *Royal Arch* and the steamer *Passport* will leave for Charleston in a few days, having the lighters in tow, and having on board the apparatus and machinery necessary for the work. The granite for the building of the jetties will, in accordance with the terms of the bid, be purchased in South Carolina. The timber to be used in the construction of the mattress will also be purchased in that State. The preliminary surveys have already been made, and the work will be commenced as soon as the steamers arrive. The steamer *Passport* will return in a few days, she having only been chartered to assist in towing the lighters to Charleston, and take her place on the line from here to Smithville.
A well-timed and judicious concession to the popular demand for reduced rates has added very greatly to the former excellent popularity of the Colonnade Hotel, Philadelphia.

The Concert Last Night.

As everyone predicted, the concert given last evening at the Opera House for the benefit of the yellow fever sufferers was a grand success, and never have we seen an audience who expressed themselves, almost as an unit, so well pleased with an entertainment of the kind. The attendance was, by far, the largest we have seen at the Opera House in a long time, and showed its appreciation of the entertainment in good, hearty, soul-stirred encores. So much pleased with the concert were they that the managers were compelled to give a double bill. The young ladies who conceived the idea of giving the concert, and who by zealous work made it the grand success of a decade, were the Misses Loula and Jennie Atkinson, Annie Empe, and Emma Hahr, and to them belongs a conscience of duty well performed. The concert was opened with a lively selection by the Cornet Concert Club, which they rendered in their usual excellent style, and was followed by the "Mendelssohn Wedding March," which was magnificently rendered by Misses L. and J. Atkinson, Empe and Hahr.
The vocal quartette "Drifting with the Tide," was so exquisitely rendered by Messrs. Brady, Myers, Welsh and Rankin that they were compelled to appear before the foot-lights. The "Old Sexton," sung by Mr. Geo. Myers, was well received and was heartily encored. Mr. M. F. Manning's rendition of "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep" was very fine. The vocal solo "Valse Brillante," sung by Mrs. Jno. W. Cameron was exquisitely rendered. Her fine mezzo-soprano voice charmed the entire audience, who kept up a prolonged encore until she appeared in response to their wishes. Mr. Nathan Mayer's solo "Goodbye Sweetheart," was an exceedingly happy effort and was heartily applauded.
A vocal duet by Mr. and Mrs. Jno. E. Lippitt was so well received that they were compelled to appear a second and third time, and in response to their encore sang "Meet me by Moonlight alone," in a manner scarcely ever equaled.
Part second of the entertainment was opened by the Cornet Concert Club with a lively and well rendered quick step, the leader, Mr. J. E. Wilson, showing himself a competent cornetist. The instrumental duet and quartettes by the Misses Atkinson, Empe and Hahr, were handsomely executed and were well received. The quartette, Messrs. Robinson, Welsh, Tilly and Manning, rendered "Moonlight on the Lake" in a manner which should be highly pleasing to them. Mr. Geo. Welsh, in his vocal solos added new laurels to his reputation and was thrice encored, and in response to one of the encores, picked his accompaniment on the banjo which was greatly enjoyed by the delighted listeners. Mr. Geo. Myers, "Irish Jentleman" was lustily applauded and very much appreciated.
The instrumental solo of Miss Hahr was simply superb, and is seldom equaled and never excelled. She has an exceedingly fine touch and is a rapid reader.
Mrs. Cameron again delighted her listeners by the rendition of several selected pieces. The Concert came to a close with a trio by Mr. and Mrs. Jno. E. Lippitt and Mr. R. C. Myers, the audience leaving for their homes carrying with them pleasant thoughts which will be remembered for years to come. The pianos used were kindly loaned by Mr. P. Heinsberger and were the best Knabe makes.
