

THE LATEST FROM THE SOUTH.

Many Yellow Fever Patients Still Dying in New Orleans and in Memphis.

MEMPHIS, Sept. 17.—Forty-six cases of deaths were reported up to noon, making 101 since yesterday noon.

Ninety-six cases of death were reported to-day, of which 24 were colored. Among the deaths to-day are J. W. Heath, an active member of the Howards; E. C. Marshall, a prominent member of the Citizens' Relief Committee; Dr. J. E. Plinn; and Bob Hammock, teller of the Fourth National Bank.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 17.—To-day's yellow fever reports show 62 cases of death and 223 new cases, of which 122 occurred prior to the 14th instant.

Ex-Assistant Postmaster McGuire was taken with the fever on Saturday, his wife on Sunday, and his son on Monday. All are doing well.

Rev. Dr. Mathews, pastor of the Carondelet street church, is down with yellow fever. A. W. Ferguson, telegraph operator at Port Eads, is reported very low. J. N. Shawhan died to-day. The death lists of the past three days include 56 children under 7 years.

CANTON, Miss., Sept. 17.—The total number of cases of yellow fever footed up 44, and the cases of death 68. For the last twenty-four hours, twenty new cases and twelve cases of death have been reported, and six or eight more are reported as dying.

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 17.—For the twenty-four hours ending at 9 o'clock this morning there have been reported two cases of death and thirty-five new cases.

MOBILE CITY, La., Sept. 17.—The fever is increasing. There were three deaths yesterday—Miss Farrell, Samuel Olive, and William Martin's little daughter. Twenty-five or thirty new cases have been reported since Saturday.

GREENADA, Miss., Sept. 17.—Samuel Hirschberg of Louisville, Ky., who had been employed as nurse in the hospital here; Mrs. Joanna Scanlon, J. H. Campbell, Jr., and a resident of Colorado, whose name is not given, died to-day. There were three new cases reported to-day.

Austrian Operations in Bosnia. VIENNA, Sept. 17.—Official intelligence has been received that General Szapary and the reinforcements which crossed the Save on the 14th instant commenced a combined action. They have occupied the important towns of Gradacac and Gracinica, the latter unopposed.

Canadians Election. TORONTO, Sept. 17.—The election for the Dominion Parliament took place to-day and passed off quietly. Up to midnight the result shows forty-eight Liberals against eighty-nine Conservatives.

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BISMARCK'S SPEECH.

The Anti-Socialist Bill Debated in the Reichstag.

BERLIN, Sept. 17.—In the Reichstag to-day Prince Bismarck supported the anti-socialist bill in an energetic speech. He said that socialism was a common danger, avowedly striving to effect a violent revolution in the existing order of society.

Prince Bismarck pointed out that the Socialist newspapers celebrated the murder of the Russian general, Mezentzov as an act of justice. He said that society was thus warned against the assassin's dagger and nobbling's gun.

Charlotte Observer: More than forty car loads of through freight have passed through this city within the past two days via the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta and Richmond & Danville Railroads.

Charlotte Observer: The chickens in several parts of the county are dying with the same sort of disease that has had such a fatal effect on the hogs, and which for the lack of a better name is called cholera.

Charlotte Observer: The news from the Catawba river freshet confirms the reports of the losses heretofore given. It is possible that some of the farmers may be able to save a half or a third of the corn on the inundated lands.

Statesville Landmark: Capt. Jno. B. Hines, yassistant Librarian of the House of Representatives, after spending the heated term in the mountains, has returned to Statesville, where he will remain until Congress convenes.

Raleigh Observer: A letter from Bennett's X Roads, Sampson county, says: Under the administration of Rev. Mr. Sandford, who, by the way, is an accomplished gentleman and scholar, there were forty-five added to the membership of Goshen M. E. Church in August last.

The Democratic District Committee met in Goldsboro on Tuesday in reference to the Congressional nomination for the State, when it was decided that the County Committee should call the people together to select delegates to attend a convention to be held in Goldsboro October 1st.

Raleigh Observer: Last Friday afternoon Thomas Pope and Webb Bell were out just across Lumber river, at Lambertton, practicing with a pistol, when Martin McLaurin passed along in search of cotton. Pope said, "Let's shoot him," and taking the pistol from the hands of Bell, immediately fired, the ball passing within about one inch of McLaurin's head.

Raleigh Observer: Mr. J. A. Hale, Revenue Agent, yesterday completed an investigation of the office of Col. I. J. Young, Collector of this District. The examination was thorough, and he at its conclusion wrote a letter complimenting Col. Young on the good management of the office, whose books and papers were found perfectly in order and correctly balanced.

Raleigh Observer: On Sunday night as some gentlemen of Shoe Heel were on their way to Lambertton to attend the Superior Court this week, a sudden and brilliant light illumined the western heavens as if the moon had suddenly shone forth in all her fullness; turning their heads they saw just in the rear a large meteor with a tail apparently about a hundred yards long, falling very rapidly.

Wilmington, N. C., Sept. 17.—Mr. Hayes arrived here to-day and received a hearty reception. He addressed the members of his old regiment—the Twenty-third Ohio—in a touching and eloquent speech. The village is elegantly and profusely decorated, and from 12,000 to 15,000 people are present.

WILMINGTON MARKET. SEPTEMBER 19—1 P. M.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE—Stock 10,578 casks. Receipts of the week 1,949 casks. Exports 2,216 casks. Since our last weekly report the market has ruled steady at 26 cents, until yesterday, when sales were made of 200 casks at 27 1/2 cents, closing quiet at that figure. Sales of the week 1,289 casks.

ROSIN—Stock 119,899 bbls. Receipts of the week 10,326 bbls. Exports 7,212 bbls. The quotations for Strained and Good Strained has ruled the same as in last week's report, viz: \$1 17 1/2 for Strained and \$1 20 for Good Strained, at which figures sales were supposed to have been made. There has been some little demand for fine rosins, and about 1,200 bbls K and M, Pale and Low Pale, changed hands at \$2 22 1/2 per bbl. Reported sales of the week of all grades aggregate 1,870 bbls.

TAR—Stock 1,327 bbls. Receipts of the week 371 bbls. Exports 1,192 bbls. There has been an advance of 15 cents during the past week, and sales have been made at \$1 75, closing firm at that figure.

CRUDE TURPENTINE—Stock 2,227 bbls. Receipts of the week 1,177 bbls. Exports —bbls. The market for this article has remained unchanged since our last report. We quote: Hard steady at \$1 00 and Soft and Virgin ditto at \$1 85, at which receipts are billed from day to day.

COTTON—Stock 722 bales. Receipts of the week 1,995 bales. Exports 1,890 bales. There has been a decline in this article of 1/4 of a cent on Low Middling and Middling since our last report. Sales of the week 1,200 bales.
