Col. Waddell in Pender County-The Flourishing Town of Lillington-First Waddell Greenback Club.

(Reported for the Review.)

Waddell was introduced to the audience in a few brief and appropriate remarks by Dr. E. Porter, Chairman of the Pender County Democratic Committee. Dr. M. J. DeRosset.

We were pleased to find in the New York Herald of the 24th inst., the subjoined extract in regard to our talented young townsman, Dr. M. John DeRosset. It will be seen that Dr. DeRosset's opinion is quoted next to that of ex-Surgeon-General Hammond.

The extract which we publish only confirms our opinion as regards the ability of Dr. DeR., which we knew only wanted a proper field to display itself in to be appreciated for its real worth. We are also gratified to learn, as we do, from private sources, that Dr. DeRosset is not only gaining in practice, but is rising in reputation in his new field of labor as a specialist physician.

The occasion of the notice which called forth Dr. DeRosset's professional opinion published below is a suit which is going on between the real estate owners on Sixth Avenue and the Elevated Railway Company, of New York. It seems that the property owners along the line of the railroad must either have suffered inconvenience or depreciation in the value of their property, or perhaps both, and in order to rid themselves of the nuisance they enter suit and get the signatures of 185 physicians to prove that the noise from the cars, if it did not cause the victims along the line to suffer paralysis or mania, would in all probability cause "deafness, dementia or death." The Grand Jury who were considering the matter heard the opinions of both sides. The following is the extract referred to above, including Dr. DeRosset's opinion:

In addition to ex-Surgeon General Hammond's striking letter the written opinions of two other eminent medical practitioners were presented. It will be remembered that the petition of the 185 doctors set forth that those living along the line of Sixth avenue, who did not fall victims to chorea, mania or paralysis in consequence of the noise, would become a prey to "deafness, dementia or death." Dr. Hammond could speak with authority on brain diseases and dementia, and in reference to deafness Dr. DeRosset, of West Thirty-sixth street, a well known aurist, gave the following opinion, which was also embodied in a letter sent to the Grand Jury:-

DR. DE ROSSET'S VIEWS.

In those branches of medicine to which my attention is more especially directed I have had much opportunity to observe the effect of the noises of the Metropolitan Elevated Railway upon vision and hearing; and I state absolutely that not one single case of disease, either of the eye or the ear, has been traceable to this source; and my own experience is confirmed by that of other gentlemen similarly engaged.

Moreover, no increase in laryngeal or pulmonary affections among the residents and tradesmen on Sixth avenue has followed the construction and operation of the elevated railway.

In my opinion the reverberations of the Metropolitan Elevated Railway endanger neither health nor life; they neither cause nor protract disease. They may be unpleasant, but they are not issues from Pandora's box, as the memorial would have us believe.

Just Think of It!

The foreign vessels which have arrived here since the first of last month have added nearly 1,000 men to the floating population of this city and, as a consequence, a considerable sum to the amount of money in circulation. They can't come faster or thicker than we would like to have them.

Lottery Wyman.

Wyman is at his old tricks in Norfolk, gathering in all the small change. If he should visit Wilmington the city authorities should tax his lottery scheme pretty heavily from the fact that where he leaves ten cents in the place on account of his concern he carries off ten dollars of the money of the people.
