Murderous Assault.
 The serenity of the citizens living in the vicinity of Seventh and Orange streets was disturbed on Saturday night about 9 1/2 o'clock by distressing cries of "murder! murder!" One colored individual crept behind another of the same color and previous condition and patted him across the head with a stick of wood, which was the cause of the cries
 We understand the assaulted colored man was badly hurt and we suppose the matter will be adjudicated by legal authority when we will be able to learn particulars and names.

Registrars and Registration.
 By notice elsewhere published it will be seen that the Registration books are to be opened in this city on tomorrow (Tuesday) the 1st day of October.
 This, be it understood, is not a new registration, but is only for the accommodation of parties who did not register during the last campaign—in July and August—and right here we will call attention to the fact that there has been some changes in the places of registration since the last election, which will be discovered by reference to the advertisement of the Registrars in this issue. There has been, however, no changes in the polling places, either in this city or in the county outside of the city, as that would require a thirty days notice by law. We were in error, therefore, in stating in our Saturday's issue that there was a change in the polling place in Harnett Township to the Stokely place. The polling place in Harnett remains the same as before, at Macomber's Store, and the registration books will also be opened there. Mr. Thos. Edens having declined to serve as registrar for that township, Mr. James W. Macomber has been appointed to fill his place.
 In the lower Division of the First Ward in this city, Mr. W. H. Yopp declined to serve as registrar and Mr. Jas. W. Conoley was appointed in his stead. This we believe about completes the changes both as regards the registrars and the places of registration, in the whole county.

City Court.
 Charles Stevens, a troublesome, noisy, disorderly character of the colored persuasion, who was arrested on Saturday afternoon by Sergeant Robert Green, of the police force, for disorderly conduct, was the first case on docket this morning. The evidence in Court, not only proved that the defendant was acting disorderly, but that he also defied the police officers to arrest him, and when arrested resisted to such an extent that officer Frost had to be summoned to assist in conveying the prisoner to the guard house. The defendant, when asked what he had to say for himself, remarked that he might have been talking a little too loud but that he was only "jokin'." His Honor said \$15 fine or 20 days in the city prison was the cost of such jokes, and the defendant, who looked as though he didn't possess fifteen cents, took the alternative of 20 days in the city prison. (Huge joke that, on Snyder.)
 The next case was that of a man resembling an Italian, with dark hair and black moustache, who was found drunk and down in an alley on South Water street on Saturday night. His Honor asked if it was the same old drunk. "Spose so," says the defendant. "Fine you \$5 and costs or ten days in the city prison," says the Court.
 The case of the two colored people, mentioned in our report of the City Court in Saturday's *REVIEW*, was not called this morning for the reason that there was a sort of patched-up reconciliation, and the case was dismissed.

Robbery.
 Saturday night thieves effected an entrance into the machine shop of Messrs. Skinner & Lyons, at the foot of Ann street, and carried off a lot of copper pipe and other metals of value. There is at present no clue to the perpetrators of the theft, but no doubt they will be pulled up by the great hand of justice as the articles stolen were of such a nature as to be easily recognized.

Rosh Hoshanah.
 The Jewish New Year was very generally observed by the people of that faith on Saturday. All their stores were closed and no business of any kind was transacted until sunset, when the places of business were opened. Services appropriate to the day were held in the Temple by the Rabbi, Rev. S. Mendelsohn.
 With the festival of Rosh Hoshanah begins the annual era known as the "Ten Days of Repentance," terminating on Monday, Oct. 7th, at sunset, with the greatest of the Hebrew holidays, "Yom Kippur," or the Day of Atonement. This is the most important and generally respected of the Jewish holidays, begins one week after "Rosh Hoshana," at sundown, and continues until the following day. The origin and institution of the festival is to be found in Leviticus xvi: "And it shall be unto you a statute forever; in the seventh month, on the tenth day of the month, you shall afflict your souls and do no work at all."
 At sunset the twenty-four hours fast and continued prayer commence, the services consisting chiefly of confessions of sin and utter unworthiness, and the Israelite imploring the divine mercy for pardon. It is customary in the evening for parents to bestow their benediction on their children. Whosoever they meet on the day, be they previously acquainted or complete strangers, are commanded to salute each other with brotherly love and sincerity. If any animosity or quarrel exists between two Hebrews, it is obligatory on them to become reconciled. He who is conscious of having wronged his neighbor, is bound to offer reparation. The law which ordains the observance of the day likewise commands the Jew to afflict his soul, which affliction, according to tradition, consists from abstaining from five indulgences—eating and drinking, bathing, perfuming, wearing shoes, and sharing the sensual pleasures—for the Israelite is this day to divest himself of all earthly passions, thoughts and considerations, and is to prefigure to himself a future state of blessedness and purity.
