

Brink has received a sample of the new packages provided under direction of the Postoflice Department at Washington for the transmission through the mails as third-class matter, certain articles, such as flour, sugar and other powdered substances and small sharp-pointed instruments heretofore excluded, excepting, of course, We understand that Mr. J. C. Mills, in all cases, liquids, poisons glass and explosive materials.

The sample received is a small tin box, like in size and shape to blacking-box, with a spring and slides to recure the lid in place so as to prevent the possibility of its slipping and thus keeping the contents secure and fast. It is a patented article, of course, and manufactured in New York.
