

The Norfolk Virginian of yesterday Capt. 

Yesterday's Norfolk Virginian contains some statistics relative to that port which will prove of interest to our readers, as compared with those which we can show for Wilmington.

It tells us that 2,946 bales of cotton were received in that city last month compared with 763 bales for September. 1877.

Last month 4 vessels, with an aggregate of 737 tons, and with cargoes valued in all at \$9,100, cleared for foreign ports against 3 vessels, with a value of \$35,-838.77 for the same month la t year, which is a showing of \$26,738.77 in favor of 1877.


