Better Not Refuse to Serve.
 It will be well in the future for those persons who shall be appointed to the position of Registrar, or as one of the Judges of an election in any ward or township, to refer to section 38, chapter 275, of the laws of North Carolina, passed in 1876-77, before they decline to serve, which provides that, upon failing or neglecting to make the returns and perform the duties required of him by this chapter, he shall be fined not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than six nor less than two months, at the discretion of the Court.

Buffalo Bill.
 The advertisement of the Buffalo Bill Combination appears in this issue. They play here but two nights, Friday and Saturday. The box sheet will be open at Heinsberger's to-day and as good seats will be in demand it would be well to secure them at once. The Norfolk *Landmark*, speaking of the appearance there of this Combination says:

This famous Western scout and his combination, composed of whites and Indians, gave their closing entertainment at the opera house last night. The thrilling border drama of "May Cody; or Lost and Won," was again presented and excellently rendered—much better than on the opening night. After the conclusion of the drama, the audience was entertained with Indian dances, shooting with the rifle and bow and arrow, &c. The exhibition of rifle-shooting by Buffalo Bill was very fine, and illustrated the remarkable accuracy of his aim. The entire entertainment gave full satisfaction to all present.

Marine Disaster.
 The Norfolk *Virginian* of yesterday says: The Norwegian bark *Alhambra*, Capt. Corneliusen, having on board the captain and crew of the Norwegian brig *Bergliot*, which was wrecked on the 20th instant, arrived in Hampton Roads on Sunday last. The captain of the *Alhambra* reports as follows: On the 20th instant answered the signals of distress of the Norwegian brig *Bergliot*, Captain H. Olsen, bound from Caen, France, to Wilmington, N. C., the brig then lying in a helpless condition in latitude 26.18, longitude 58.27, having encountered a hurricane on the 17th of September, which carried away the rigging and did other damage, making it necessary to abandon her. The crew of the *Bergliot* were brought up to the city yesterday morning on the steamer *Accomack*, and were taken in charge by Col. William Lamb, Norwegian consul at this port.

Registration Again.
 By notice elsewhere published it will be seen that Captain J. N. Maffitt, Justice of Harnett township, agrees with our report of the proceedings of the Board of Magistrates, held at the Court House in this city on Saturday last. In that report we stated that the polling place of Harnett had been changed to John Cameron's at the Stokely place, but upon the representation of some of the officials we corrected what they thought an error by stating upon the strength of their statement that our report was incorrect in regard to the change in the polling place. But Captain Maffitt comes to the front this morning and informs the voters of Harnett through an advertisement in this issue, and assures us personally, that our report was correct, and that he, as Chairman of the Committee appointed to consider the matter, recommended the change, which was in accordance with the law; moreover the recommendation was accepted, adopted and ordered by the Board in session on last Saturday the 28th ult. consequently the polls in Harnett township will be opened on Tuesday, the 5th day of November at John Cameron's on the Stokely place.

The Registration books will be kept open at Macomber's Store until that time.

Norfolk and Wilmington.
 Yesterday's Norfolk *Virginian* contains some statistics relative to that port which will prove of interest to our readers, as compared with those which we can show for Wilmington.

It tells us that 2,946 bales of cotton were received in that city last month as compared with 763 bales for September, 1877.

Last month 4 vessels, with an aggregate of 737 tons, and with cargoes valued in all at \$9,100, cleared for foreign ports against 3 vessels, with a value of \$35,838.77 for the same month last year, which is a showing of \$26,738.77 in favor of 1877.

Now, look at this exhibit at Wilmington for the month of September in 1877 and in 1878, the facts relative to the exports having been taken by us from the books at the Custom House in this city:

The receipts of cotton in September, 1877, were 2,464 bales against 9,278 for September, 1878.

In September, 1877, 19 vessels cleared foreign from this port. They represented six nationalities, had an aggregate tonnage of 6,038 and carried cargoes valued at \$168,992.

In September, 1878, 46 vessels cleared foreign, representing six nationalities, with an aggregate of 13,875 tons and with cargoes valued at \$336,968.

The increase is all in favor of 1878 and is as follows: Cotton, 6,814 bales; vessels 27; tonnage, 7,837; value of exports \$167,976.

The Court was for the trial of a supposed criminal case, the prosecution having been conducted by Mr. Hall, of Williamsport, Pa., and the defence by Mr. T. P. Ricard, Jr. Both of these young gentlemen acquitted themselves very handsomely.

Sunday School Exhibition at Pike Creek, in Pender County.
 We learn from a friend that the Sabbath schools of Burgaw and Pike Creek Church, of Pender county, held a joint exhibition at the latter place, about five miles from Burgaw, on Friday last. It is spoken of as a very happy occasion, in which complete enjoyment was experienced. There was some very fine singing and recitations, in which the children who participated deserve much credit. After the exercises by the children were concluded, Rev. D. B. Black, W. T. Bannerman, Esq., and John T. Bland, Esq., made interesting addresses in behalf of the Sunday-school cause. This exhibition was gotten up by the members of the Pike Creek Sunday School, and their friends from Burgaw were invited guests and participants, and we learn that it is now the intention to have it repeated at no distant day at Burgaw, at which the Pike Creek school will be the guests. We congratulate our Pender friends, not only upon the success which attended their late efforts, but upon their deep and earnest interest in the Sunday-school cause.
