French Cream Cake-

One cup of sugar, three eggs, three tablespoons cold water, one and a half cups of flour, one teaspoon Dooley's YEAST POWDER. Bake in a quick oven twenty minutes.

FOR THE CREAM .- Scald nearly a pint of milk, dissolve two heaping tablespoons corn-starch in a little milk, beat this with two eggs, and a small teacup of sugar; stir this into the milk, and when it is boiled add a heaping tablespoon of butter; stir smooth, and flavor with vanilla or lemon. Split the cake while warm, and spread with the cream. This is sufficient for two cakes.

Short Crops.

We learn from a correspondent who has traveled within the last two weeks over considerable portions of Pender, Sampson and Duplin counties, that the hard-working farmers of those counties, (especially of those parts bordering on Black river) have not been successful in securing good crops this season. The dry weather of the early summer cut off in a great measure much of the crops planted on the uplands, while the later rains drowned out a large portion of the lowlands, so that the farmers of those localities will reap but a meagre harvest. In a circuit traveled of over a hundred miles, there was not a really good crop of corn or cotton, and many of the farmers were very despending. One planter who generally has raised 300 barrels of corn to sell, aside from that consumed on the plantation, stated that unless he disposed of some of his stock, he should have to buy corn to last him until another crop was harvested. Fortunately, this condition of things does not prevail in many other localities, or there would be much suffering. In many places away from these named, good crops were reported, and in some localities better than the average.
