The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 1,048 bales.  
The Board of County Commissioners meet in regular monthly session on Monday next.  
Rice birds seem to have entirely disappeared from the market, coots having taken their place.  
A telegraph office has been established at Beaver Dam Station, Union County, on the Carolina-Central Railway.  
Bishop Atkinson will serve in St John's Church on Sunday next at 11 o'clock in the morning and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.  
Buffalo Bill and his troupe arrived at noon to-day on the Carolina Central railway, and open at the Opera House to-night.

A regular March day this has been. The wind it blew, and the dust it flew—in almost sufficient quantities to nearly blind the pedestrians of the wharf.  
Some weather prophet out West foretold very severe frost from the 1st to the 4th of this month. That fellow might as well haul in his shingle now.  
We regret to learn that Col. E. D. Hall is still confined to his house from sickness, and that his condition is not so favorable as was reported a day or two ago.  
The little steamer Clinton, which formerly ran between this city and Bannerman's Bridge, on the North East river, is being overhauled and repaired and will again be put on that rivet next week.  
A protracted meeting will commence on to-morrow, Saturday morning, at 11 o'clock, in the Methodist church at Rocky Point, Pender county, to be conducted by Rev. J. B. Bailey, the pastor of the Topsail circuit.

John Carroll, at the Cosmopolitan, has received the first lot for the season of those celebrated Winberry New River oysters which are so hard to beat. They are offered for sale now over his restaurant counter in any style desired.  
**The Greenbackers.**  
The Greenbackers had a big talk in the Fourth Ward last night, at which the most brilliant lights were tar barrels. There were speakers present and "music by the band," the whole going to make up something like an old-fashioned political jubilee.  
**Presbytery of Wilmington.**  
We learn that an adjourned meeting of the Presbytery of Wilmington will be held in the Presbyterian church at Goldsboro, on Wednesday, 23rd of October next, at 3 o'clock p. m. The Synod of North Carolina will assemble there on the same day. The several railroads extend the courtesies of reduced rates.

**Died of the Fever.**  
We regret to learn, from information received here to-day, that Mr. Arch. McCollum, who, it will be remembered, was one of the three gentlemen who left this city for Memphis about one month ago, as volunteer nurses for the sufferers, died yesterday of the fever. There are no particulars as yet received to his death.  
**Magistrate's Court.**  
We understand that several parties have been arraigned before Justice Wagner during the past two days upon warrants for failing to comply with the law for listing their poll taxes.  
In these cases to-day we learn that judgment was suspended upon payment of the tax and the costs in the case. On yesterday one party was committed to jail for non-payment of the costs.  
**The State Fair and the Military.**  
Last night a telegram was received from the Adjutant-General of the State by General M. P. Taylor, saying that arrangements had been made by which free transportation would be furnished the troops attending the annual encampment at the State Fair, and that they would move on the 4th inst. It is hoped that the various commands who go up from this city will carry full ranks.  
**The Brunswick Election Case.**  
The injunction case in the matter of the returns from Town Creek, in Brunswick county, was argued yesterday at Brunswick Court, Judge Russell appearing for the plaintiffs, and Jno. D. Bellamy, Jr. Esq., for the defence. The injunction was dismissed, whereupon Judge Russell stated his intention of appealing to the Supreme Court, but it is not thought that he will carry it there. He also applied for a rule restraining certain officers from qualifying until a decision could be had in the Supreme Court, but this Judge Buxton set aside.

**A North Carolina Victim of the Yellow Fever.**  
It will be remembered by our readers that on the 23rd ult. a dispatch was received by one of the officials of the W. & W. Railroad, at this place, from Mr. John E. Becton, Master Machinist at Water Valley, Mississippi, stating that the yellow fever had broken out in the railroad shops located at that place, and asking for assistance. In response to this call \$145 were subscribed by the officers and employes of the road and forwarded to Water Valley. At that time Mr. Becton was well and doing all that he could for the sufferers, but yesterday the sad intelligence came to his parents, at Bowden's Station, Duplin county, that he had fallen a victim to the fell disease. Mr. Becton was a North Carolinian by birth, and learned his trade of a machinist at the W. & W. Railroad shops in this city.  
**They Have Come.**  
Buffalo Bill and his extraordinary troupe arrived to-day at noon on a special train from Charlotte.  
The combination comprises, besides an excellent dramatic company, a band of Indians direct from Indian Territory, of the Nez Perce and Pawnee tribes.  
The drama that is presented is of a strictly society nature; the scenes in the first act are laid in a Fifth Avenue residence, New York, and from thence to the Mormon Temple of Brigham Young, Salt Lake. It treats solely with events that have transpired with only fiction enough to give it the necessary love infatuation that is indispensable in all plays.  
The title is "May Cody, or Lest and Wcn" and the press everywhere speak of it and the actors in the highest terms. The Company lately played a week in Washington and Baltimore in the Grand Opera Houses of John T. Ford, who has the Combination under his management.  
After the drama, the Indians give an exhibition of their accomplishments, such as dances, nuptial ceremonies and target shooting with bows and arrows, &c. &c., making a distinct entertainment, of an entirely different nature. We expect to see crowded houses both nights.

**For the Sufferers.**  
The box of tobacco so generously contributed by the manufacturer, Mr. Jno. A. Long, of Roxboro, N. C., for the benefit of the yellow fever sufferers, was sold at auction yesterday by Messrs. Cronly & Morris. It was a box of "Our Harry" tobacco, weighed 40 pounds and was knocked down to Mr. H. Burkheimer at 50 cents a pound. There were no charges on it, neither for freight, crayage, commissions or advertising, and hence the net amount realized was the \$20 for which it sold.  
**Buffalo Bill's Parade.**  
Buffalo Bill and his Pawnees were out on a street parade this afternoon mounted on horses and preceded by a band of music in a wagon, followed by the celebrated little donkey which is attached to the troupe, and surrounded by innumerable white and colored urchins together with some of older growth. Wm. Cody or Buffalo Bill is a tall handsome looking man of about thirty, or thereabouts, wears his hair long and looks like one who is fond of adventure and has the appearance at the same time of a man who when he encounters a danger never turns his back upon it.
