



From the Leavenworth Time . WHY THE CHEVENNES FIGHT.

Maddened by Outrages Perpetrated by the Whites.


11874 the Southern Cheyennes, Comanches, and Kiowas united againct The Comauches give the following as baffalo hunting by white rangers was carried on to an alarming extent. They killed thousands of buffalo, securing the hides only, and leaving the wams pillaged. A stray warrior, if or Little Powder River. pursuit, and wounded many of them, among others a son of Little Robe, The Comanches and Kiowas then joined them in a serious war, raiding through Kansas to the Republican, killing many women, children, and settlers, and carrying off others, several young girls being taken to the Staked Plains of Texas, where they were afterwards recaptured. Gen. Miles, from the Department of Kansas, and Gen. Mackenzie, from Teras, were sent on what is known as Miles' first Indian expedition. Miles operated against the Chevennes, and Mackenzie against the Comanches, many of the Indians being killed. At the close of the war the Indians were brought into the sgencies, and their cattle, horses, and arms taken from them. The southern Cheyennes then became so crippled that they have never again gone to After their war with the Sloux in stopping the survey of the Northern Pacific, the northern' Cheyennes were quiet until 1875-6, when they joined in the Sitting Bull war on account of the occupation of the Black Hills. A year ago last spring Dull Knife's band-the Cheyennes who are making for the North-came into old Red Cloud Agency and surrendered to Gen. Crook. The remainder of the band, under Little Chief, Brave Wolf and Two Moons, came to the mouth of the Tongue River and surrendered to Miles. In these divisions many families became separated. The Government decided to consolidate the Cheyennes in a single agency at Camp Supply, where there is a good reservation and a large one, and Dull Knife's band were taken there, and told that their friends and relatives at the mouth of the Tongue River would Kuife's band had for some time been threstening to go, and at last, probaof the tribe would not join them, started "on their own hook." 

One officer has made the statement that in his own country one Cheyenne is worth two or three sol-

diers. Gen. Crook says that they are the best Indian wardiors in the country. They have finer features than the Siour, and are quicker and more intelligent. They are a superior race of savages morally, the family tie is of the strongest nature, and violation of chastity among the women is punished by exile or death.
