Yesterday's Washington Post has this to say of the capture of one John Brudell, aliat St. Louis Johnny, a notorious rogue, who robbed Col. Waddell iast May, at his hotel in Washington City, of **\$150:**

Detectives McDevitt and Voss made the quite important arrest last night of John Brudell, alias St. Louis Johnny. Mr. McDevitt was looking for another "wanted" . party, and on entering O'Brien's saloon, near the Baltimore and Ohio depot, saw Brudell drinking at the bar and took him in.
