### Short Supply.

For the past two weeks the supply of ice in this market has been short and Mr. Lippitt has been compelled to cut off his country orders. To-day there is not to exceed five hundred pounds in the ice house in this city. The small quantity on hand will be sold only in case of sickness. To-morrow morning a car load of ice is expected from Norfolk.

### Another Sharp Trick.

Yesterday morning a young colored individual, John Treville by name, came to town from the Sound with a horse and cart, and after disposing of his cart load of truck which he had for sale, disposed of his horse also, for the sum of thirty-five dollars. Dan. Howard the jailor becoming the purchaser. This morning a colored man by the name of Samuel Hines, from Topsail Sound, came to town without a horse and cart, but in search of the one which the afore mentioned John Treville came with yesterday, which Hines lays claim to as his property, having only loaned them, as he alleges, to Treville to come to market with yesterday. Howard, the purchaser of the horse says that young Treville showed him a letter purporting to be from his father John Treville, which stated that the horse belonged to the latter named party, and that his son George had permission to sell him.

### City Court.

Wm. Brown, colored, arrested last night for disorderly conduct upon complaint of a Market street merchant, was discharged on the payment of costs, the prosecution having been withdrawn.

### Large Cargo for One Vessel.

Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son shipped on yesterday, per British barquentine *Ruth*, 219 tons gross, 1,380 bales of cotton for Liverpool. This is the largest cargo, to tonnage of vessel, ever taken out of Wilmington, the average being 45 bales of 40 pounds each, to the ton register. This cargo was stored by Mr. G. W. Baly and the bales were pressed by the Champion Compress.

### Abandoned.

Sat. barque *Asta*, Capt. Danielson, which arrived here to-day from Liverpool, reports that on Oct. 18th, in latitude 29, 12 N and longitude 73, 36 W fell in with the tern schooner *Frederick*, of St. John's, N. B., water logged and abandoned, with a cargo of lumber. Her crew—mist was gone and the foresail and mainmast blown. Ran close under the lee of the schooner to board her but was prevented by the swell.

### A Murderer Caught.

Henry Spears, colored, who killed one Charles Foy, colored, at Halifax, on Wednesday last, account of which we published yesterday, was arrested this morning, about five miles above the city, by officer Bryan, who was armed with a warrant issued by Justice Harris, and is now in jail. He submitted quietly to arrest and alleges that the killing was done in self-defence. He will be held to await the demand of the Sheriff of Halifax.
