The Fire This Morning.

Early this morning, between 3 and 4
o'clock, a building on Seventh street,
near Castle, owned and occupied by Mr.
J. S. McEachern as a storehouse, was dis-
covered to be on fire. The fire depart-
ment was out promptly and the flames
were confined to the building in which it
originated. The *Adrian* was at the shops
for repairs and the *Cape Fear* and the
Little Giant were on the ground, the
latter throwing the first stream. The
building and contents were all destroyed.
Insurance with Messrs. DeRosset &
Northrop for \$200 on the building and
\$300 on the stock. Origin of fire un-
known.

Ship Yard Notes.

The German barque *Kosmo* is on
the railway undergoing repairs.
The Norwegian brig *Fred* is under-
going repairs, as is also the Spanish brig
Dos Cunados.
Light ship No. 29 of Rattlesnake
shoal was brought to the city yesterday
and is lying at Messrs. Cassiday & Ross'
wharf awaiting extensive repairs.

Some Statistics—A Good Showing for October.

This being the first of the month and
what is known as stock day at the Pro-
duce Exchange, when stock ashore and
afloat, together with receipts and exports
for the month just passed, are posted on
the boards, we availed ourselves of the
opportunity to gather the following in-
formation:

The receipts of cotton at this port for
the month of Oct. 1878 was 28,452 bales
against 23,558 bales for the same period
last year; of spirits there were 8,129
casks against 7,253 casks in 1877; of
rosin there were 43,041 bbls, against 39,
940 bbls, in 1877; of tar there were 3,971
bbls, against 1,904 bbls in 1877; of crude
turpentine, there were 9,527 bbls, against
9,221 in 1877, showing a gain in cotton for
October of this year of 4,894 bales; in
spirits, of 876 casks; in rosin, of 3,092
bbls; in tar, of 1,977 bbls; in crude tur-
pentine, of 36 bbls.

The exports of cotton for Oct. 1878
were 20,665 bales against 9,109 bales in
1877; of spirits 8,059 casks against 4,654
casks in 1877; of rosin 45,781 bbls against
29,747 bbls in 1877; of tar 3,452 bbls
against 2,872 bbls in 1877; of crude 243
bbls against 606 for the same period in
1877.

Showing a gain in the exports of Octo-
ber, 1878, as follows:

- In Cotton.....11,556 bales
- In Spirits Turpentine..... 3,405 casks
- In Rosin.....16,034 bbls
- In Tar..... 580 "

In crude turpentine there were larger
exports in October, 1877, than October
1878 by 363 bbls. But in all the other
products there is a very flattering showing
in the way of an increase in favor of Octo-
ber, 1878.
