Ordered that Nicholas Carr be notified that he is required to give a new bond by the first regular meeting in December, one of his sureties having recently deceased.

Ordered that Commissioner Worth be authorized to enquire into the expense and the best mode of heating the Poor House.

On motion the Board adjourned until next Thursday, at 2 1/2 o'clock.

Sudden Death.

Coroner Hewitt held an inquest this morning over the body of a colored man by the name of William Tucker, an old and well-known resident, who died very suddenly at his house on the corner of Fourth and Harnett streets, at which place he has for some time past carried on the grocery business.

Deceased was in his usual health last evening and about 10 o'clock last night went to the house of a neighbor, Mrs. Elizabeth Gray, to leave a message in regard to some work. He began to deliver the message, but while doing so was taken ill and dropped to the floor where he was made as comfortable as possible, gradually getting worse. This is from the evidence of Mrs. Gray. This morning, about 7 o'clock, he was removed to his home, where he died very soon after.

Deceased was between 60 and 65 years of age. Drs. Lane and McDonald made an examination and certified to the jury that he died from heart disease, whereupon a verdict to that effect was rendered.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in adjourned regular session last evening at the City Hall. The Mayor was absent and Aldermen Myers, Bowden, Flanner, Von Glahn, Vollers, Foster, King and Lowrey were present.

Alderman Myers was called to the chair and then, on motion of Aldermen Flanner, the meeting was adjourned until next Monday evening.
