Big Freshet.

By the steamer North State to-day from Fayetteville we learn that the river has risen thirty-five feet since Friday, but commenced falling again on Saturday morning. From the same source we learn that the freshet in Deep river has washed away some of the works of the Western Railroad over that stream, which will necessitate an outlay of about five hundred dollars to replace.

Pilots Sounding.

The pilots report as the result of their soundings at low tide during the month of November the following depth of water: In Bald Head channel bar at low water there is nine feet and ten inches of water. In the western channel on the bar at low water there is twelve feet of water. On the rip at the same stage of the tide there is eight feet of water.
There is generally a rise of five or six feet at high tide.

Exports for November

From the books at the Custom House we gather the following items of interest relative to the exports from this port during the month of November just closed:

During the month 51 vessels cleared from this port foreign. The exports were 26,016 bales of cotton, valued at \$1,125,356; 53,173 bbls rosin and turpentine valued at \$76,689; 12 bbls pitch, valued at \$19; 8,272 casks spirits turpentine valued at \$92,298; 615,738 feet lumber, valued at \$10,268; 532,500 shingles, valued at \$3,158; and miscellaneous articles valued at \$1,358. The total exports foreign during the month were, in American bottoms \$8,920; in foreign bottoms \$1,300,226, a total export for the month of \$1,309,146, against \$437,205 for November, 1877, the gain for this year being \$871,941.

Boston Tea Bread.

To one quart of flour add two teaspoonsful DOOLEY'S YEAST POWDER, a little salt, butter the size of an egg rubbed in the flour, one pint sweet milk, and the yolks of two eggs beaten very light.
