Some Historic Ground. Talking about old burying places, it is known to very few, and those the oldest of our people, that the site now occupied by the City Hall, known in ye olden time as "The Old Academy Hill," as well as most of the square on which it stands, was once a grave yard. There is no record of this but it must have dated back as far as the Revolutionary War and it is supposed that the ground was used at that time by the British troops quartered here. There is no record of the fact, however, and nothing is known beyond the discovery of bones and decaying coffins all over the ground. The Old Academy, a huge structure of brick which contained a theatre on the first floor and academy rooms above. and which was pulled down a few years previous to the war to make room for the was erected somewhere about the year and H. C. Prempert. 1800 or 1801. This was only about seventeen or eighteen years after the close of the Revolutionary War and we are therefore led to doubt the fact of the ground having been used for the interment of British soldiers as the building would hardly have been erected upon a graveyard less than a quarter of a century old. We therefore incline to the opinion that the interments there were made at a period of time considerably prior to the Revolutionory War and that the site upon which the City Hall now stands was probably night. the place of burial for the earliest settlers at this place.

The ground upon which the City Hall building now stands was about the year 1800 the property of Mr. William Campbell and was by him donated to the town for the purpose for which it was used. The old Academy building was erected by subscription from the then citizens of Wilmington.

Cold Blooded Murder-The Murderers Arrested and Lodged in the Smithville Jail-They Confess the Crime.

on Monday last a most cold blooded and brutal murder was committed on the plantation of Mr. J. A. Evans, in Brunswick county, about twelve miles from this city, and we are pleased to state that the murderers have been arrested and lodged in the Smithville jail. All the parties to the murder are colored men and the trouble is supposed to have grown out of what the murderers considered a lie told nection with a little irregularity concern- against them by the victim of their rage.

Mr. Evans has had a man by the name of McDuffie, formerly of Pender county, employed as a wood cutter for some time past. On Monday, about aundown, Mr. Evans saw two colored men, by the name of Davis, who are brothers, pass his house, going in the direction of McDuffie's cot. They we e armed with guns and passed Mr. Evans' on a run. They called McDuffie out, asked him if had said 'so and so," and then shot him. On their way to McDuffle's house they teld a colored man that they were going to kill McDuffie if he said he had told "so and so" about them.

The Davis brothers were captured about eleven o'clock on Monday night at Meares' Bluff. Tuesday an inquest was held over the body of the murdered man and the brothers were committed to iail to answer to the charge of murder at the next term of the Superior Court of Brunswick county.


