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LOCAL NEWS.

Publication Received.
We have received the December number of the *Planter and Farmer*, published at Richmond, Va. It contains 65 pages of reading matter contributed by some of the best farmers in the country. A Sunday Excursion and what came of it.
Three youths, about eighteen years of age, and one young lad, about nine, named respectively, George Barr, Rufus Skipper, William Wheeler and William Burk, started out in a boat yesterday (Sunday) afternoon, about 1 o'clock, for a sail. Things went very smoothly for a while, the sails caught the breeze and were nicely filled, the boat's bow cut the water in beautiful style, making pretty ripples on either side, and the young men enjoyed themselves finely while they watched the motions and movement of their little bark as she sped through the water. But suddenly, when near the "Dram Tree," there was a change in the movements of the little craft—a flaw struck the sails and overturned the boat, and soon the four boys were struggling for life in the muddy waters of the Cape Fear. The three largest clung to the bottom of the boat, but the lad, Willie Burk, could not reach or get hold, and Skipper held him up by allowing him to cling to his back. In this position they were found by the steam tug *Douglass*, at 3 o'clock, P. M., as she was returning from Smithville. Captain Latham immediately rescued them from their perilous position and landed them safely on his steamer. But their condition was such from having been so long in the water that they needed attendance at once. Consequently they were stripped of their clothes and two or three stalwart members of the crew of the *Douglass* commenced rubbing them down in order to produce a reaction. As soon as the steamer landed a physician was sent for and Dr. Lane, who responded to the call, administered the proper restoratives to the young men, and soon had them all right again.

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City Court.

His Honor Mayor Fishplate presiding. J. P. Franklin, colored, arrested on Saturday night, charged with disorderly conduct, was discharged.

George Redd, colored, arrested on Saturday night, for boisterous conduct, loud cursing and swearing and assuming a beligerent attitude towards another colored brother, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, or six days in the city prison.

"Col." Wm. Tecumseh Cut-lar—a big name, and a big man, too, is the Colonel about election times—was arraigned upon the charge of disorderly conduct, fighting in the streets, &c. His Honor, after hearing the evidence in the case, said he would require the Col. to put \$10 down, or lodge fifteen days in the city prison.

Alice Kelly, white, a poor, degraded, fallen wretch, who still has youth so far as years are concerned, and a few traces of womanly beauty that have not been entirely obliterated by her dissipated life, was arraigned again this morning for being drunk and disorderly. The Mayor pronounced sentence of fifteen days in the city prison.

Criminal Court.

The Court convened promptly at ten o'clock, His Honor Judge Meares presiding. A greater portion of the forenoon was taken up in disposing of cases which had to be continued on account of the absence of counsel at Pender Court. The Court has been in continuous session from the hour it convened up to this writing, 3 o'clock, no recess having been taken for dinner. The following cases have been disposed of to-day:

State vs. Frances Hargrave, charged with larceny, verdict not guilty.

State vs. Mack Daniel, charged with assault and battery. Judgment suspended upon payment of costs.

State vs. J. C. Hill, charged with malfeasance in office, on trial.

Horns and Guns and Pistols.

Mayor Fishplate informs us that the restrictions as to the tooting of horns, by the boys, will be removed next week; but that the abominable, intolerable, outrageous and, withal, dangerous discharge of firearms will not be allowed during Xmas or at any other time. He will issue a proclamation to this effect in a few days.
