Count Commissioners.

We published yesterday the proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners up to our close and present herewith the remainder:

Ordered, that the matter of painting the county jail be referred to the committee on Public Buildings with power to act.

Ordered, that the Overseers of the Garden road be requested to report to the Board at its next meeting in January, 1879, the number of hands and a list of the same subject to road duty, and that said overseer be requested to appear in person.

On motion it was ordered that the matter of heating the Insane department of the Poor House, and furnishing a stove to the same, be referred to Commissioner Worth with power to act.

Ordered, that Margaret Sidberry, of Harnett Township, be admitted into the Poor House.

The Board then proceeded to draw the regular venire of jurors to serve at the January term of the Superior Court, which convenes on the second Monday in January next, with the following result:

First Two Weeks—Evander McBride, Claus Schriver, John A. Barker, Seth W. Davis, John Carroll, Jesse Farrow, John E. St. George, Robert Thomas, H. Brunhill, Archie Alderman, Nathan Reeves, Thomas H. Henderson.

Second Two Weeks—C. B. Futch, John H. Hooper, C. H. Alexander, J. W. Galloway, Wm. M. Parker, Wm. Martin, Benj. Hollis, James Wilson, H. A. Martindale, Jeremiah Hewlett, Samuel G. Northrop, Samuel Blumenthal.

The Board adjourned to meet again on the 27th inst., at 2 p. m.

Lippincott's Magazine.

Lippincott's Magazine for January, beginning the new volume, has a varied and attractive list of contents. There are three illustrated articles—"Yorkshire Byways," "The Artists' Island," and "Wild Boars and Boar Hunting." Miss Laffan contributes a striking story of Irish life called "Flitters, Tatters, and the Counsellor." "A Young Girl's Experiences during the Two Sieges of Paris," gives a thrilling picture of the life of a Parisian family at the time of the Franco-German war, and the fearful scenes enacted under the Commune. A series of stories under the general title of "Women's Husbands" is begun in this number. Edward C. Bruce gives a graphic account of a "Western Town." D. C. Macdonald describes a "Trip to Newfoundland." Mrs. Hooper sketches the career of Madame Dubarry, and Sidney Lanier gives us "A Fairy Tale for Grown People." There are two very striking poems in the number—"The Poet's Protest," by Alfred R. Louis, and "Christus!" by Julia C. R. Door. Miss Olney's charming serial, "Through Winding Ways," grows in interest, and the "Monthly Gossip" contains several papers deserving of notice. The whole number is bright and thoroughly readable from beginning to end. We notice that the publishers furnish free to all new subscribers, in book-form, that portion of "Through Winding Ways" that has appeared previous to the issue of the January number.

Fashion Notes.

The other style, adopted by the elite for receptions at home, shows the hair laid flat against the back of the head and neck in what are called "Oriental braids," of many strands, held down by ornaments, some plain and others sparkling with jewels.

Hemenway Public School.

One of the pleasantest hours it has been our good fortune to spend for some time past was spent this morning at the Hemenway Public School, near the corner of Campbell street, taught by Mrs. Flora J. Wise as Principal, and her assistants, Mrs. Laura P. Rothwell, Mrs. M. O. Wallace, Miss Mary Duguid and Miss Alice Phiyaw. There are one hundred and thirty-one names on the roll books of the school and the attendance as a general thing is very good. The scholars show that they are well disciplined and well taught and their movements are regulated with military precision and order upon the tap of the bell.  
 On the "Golden List," for perfect lessons for the past month, are recorded the names of Masters John Voss, Eddie Moore, Herbert Holden, Albert Blizzard, Frank Welton, and Misses Mittie Monroe, Annie Freeman, Jennie Sylvia and Lena McQuigg. The "Roll of Honor" for propriety of deportment contains the names of Masters Frank Welton, Willie Bloom, Fred Bissinger, Joseph Kennedy, and Misses Jennie Sylvia, Lena McQuigg, Katie Bunting, Josie Howland and Julia Yopp.  
 All the English branch are taught besides kindergarten and object lessons, and the recitations of the children reflected great credit on themselves and on those whose duty it was to impart to them the store of general knowledge they have received. The geometrical diagrams drawn and explained by the scholars were exceedingly fine. Upon our arrival at the school rooms, the scholars were taking their noon recess, and when summoned by the bell, they marched in the rooms and filed to their respective seats in a manner and with that order which is pleasing to witness.  
 After reciting the Commandments, a psalm, and singing their opening hymn, they went through the calisthenic exercises, led by Master Walter Shaw, which included the body, arm, foot and head movements. The precision with which these exercises were executed was wonderful. As a health movement they are looked upon as indispensable by many physicians. The little ones in the primary department, presided over by Miss Phiyaw, are a curiosity. The are taught orally, and their knowledge of the geography of the world would do credit to much older heads. They are thoroughly taught the kindergarten and object lessons, and have the names of geometrical figures at their tongues' ends.  
 The main room of the school is provided with new and comfortable desks and seats, and the little ones in the primary department have for their use nice, comfortable little chairs, with book racks attached.  
 We were not aware of the high state of perfection to which the art of instructing the young had been brought in our public schools and in the future ignorance will no longer be a misfortune, but a crime; for knowledge is now imparted without money and without price. Wilmington has just cause to be proud of her public schools, and parents ought to recognize the importance of sustaining them by their recognition of the merit which is in them.
