the reward offered.

On Saturday night an aged colored  
woman living on Fourth street just over  
the railroad bridge was frozen to death.  
A colored minister who proved himself a  
"Good Samaritan" discovered the wo-  
man's awful condition and did all he  
could to relieve her. When the unfortu-  
nate woman was discovered she was  
speechless, but the fact that she was  
frozen to death stared them in the face  
who saw her. The woman it seemed  
worked out and slept at night in the hut  
in which she died! There was a flue for  
a stove pipe in the chimney, but as there  
was no stove she could not build a fire,  
and it is supposed she laid herself down  
to rest at night, and for the lack of proper  
bedding she was frozen to death.

Davis was detailed for the work, and  
together the two men succeeded in nab-  
bing Davis and conveying him to the  
guard house. But before his arrest, Davis  
had just had a difficulty with  
one Dick Brown colored, at  
whose hands he received a slash  
in the arm with a knife. Davis and  
Brown it seems both aspire to the love  
of the same Desdemona, and Davis  
believing he would find, his rival en-  
joying the sweets of the gentle one's  
society, last night, mad with passion  
like unto the unlucky Moer, and thinking  
only of revenge armed himself with a  
bar of iron, and proceeded to his loved  
one's house, muttering revenge deep and  
dire as he proceeded. But in the on-  
slaught, Davis got arrested, and eventually  
locked up. The immediate cause of his  
arrest, was the fact that Davis was to  
have appeared for trial at the last term of  
the Criminal Court, and jumped his bond.  
Nichols it seems was one of his bondsmen,  
hence his desire to see Davis taken.

The prisoner was this morning turned  
over to the Sheriff, who in turn com-  
mitted him to jail to await his trial at the  
next term of the Criminal Court. Dr.  
W. W. Lane was called in and dressed  
the wounded man's arm which we learn  
however is not of a very serious nature.
