press it, mean low tide. But there is a

## The Fire Fiend in Wilmington During 1878.

Sixty-six fires occurred in this city  
during the year 1878, just closed, of which  
number only twenty-three required the  
presence of the Fire Department. The  
*Little Giant* threw the first stream upon  
thirteen; the *Adrian*, upon five, and the  
*Cape Fear* upon five of the conflagrations.  
The number of fires in each month, was  
as follows:—January 5, February 3, March  
6, April 3, May 7, June 6, July 2, August  
1, September 4, October 11, November 10,  
December 8. Total, 64. We are indebted

## To Revive Frosted Plants.

Plants are often frosted through neglect  
and allowed to die through ignorance.  
Those that have been quite severely nip-  
ped may be saved if treated rightly. The  
proper way is, when the frost has been  
partially drawn out of them, naturally,  
to drench them with cold water from a  
fine-nosed watering pot, and immediately  
cover again and let them so remain until  
they regain their natural color. When  
they are removed clip off all such parts  
as are blackened. As soon as it is discov-  
ered that a plant has been touched by  
frost, rearve it to a cool, dry room, and  
on no account suffer the sun to shine on it.  
If they can be covered so as to exclude air  
as well as light it is better still. Dablias,  
cannas and the like need not be removed  
until the frosts are severe enough to black-  
en the leaves.
