### Winter Work for the Farmer.

Haul to the house and cut up wood nough to last the family a year. If you have not a wood shed, make one large enough to chop wood in during stormy weather and to hold a year's supply. If any posts are needed for fencing or other purposes, make cr procure them, and dress them for future use. Split the rails and make and repair fences when weather will permit. If any lumber will be needed procure it. Secure such material as may be needed for making harrow or plow beams, wagon tongues or other purposes. Haul saw logs to the mill. Break down the corn stalks when the ground is frozen, and can't leave that work to be done in the Spring. Put all the implements and machines in repair. Oil and repair the harness. Paint wagons and implements, and be ready for work in the Spring.
