This Weather.

After the recent succession of sharp winds and polar waves a very grateful change in the temperature has arrived which almost suggests the salubrity of mid-spring. Yesterday, overcoats and other wrappings were quite unnecessary and unseasonable, and even fires were disagreeable. This is, however, the very kind of weather for people, through careless exposure to contract, colds, and we warn our readers to be on their guard, notwithstanding the clement and balmy air.

Methodism.

From the publisher, Mr. Wolfe, of the Monroe Enquirer, we acknowledge the receipt of the "Journal of the Forty-Second Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, held at Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 27th to Dec. 2d, 1878. Edited by the Rev. B. Craven, D. D., LL. D." From it we glean the following, which will be of interest to the members of that denomination in this district: Number of white members, 5,883; No. of infants baptized during the year, 269; No. of adults baptized, 228; No. of Sabbath Schools 74; No. of officers and teachers 381; No. of scholars 2,816. There has been an increase of membership during 1878 over 1877 of 8,228, increase in number of Sabbath Schools 48; increase in officers and teachers 555; increase of scholars 3,509. We also notice that in the financial exhibit the Churches in this city compare favorably with any in the State.

Meeting at the Produce Exchange.

In accordance with notice previously given, a large number of the business men and influential citizens generally assembled at the rooms of the Produce Exchange at noon to-day. On motion, the meeting was organized by Mr. Donald MacRae being called to the chair and Capt. Robert Lilly being requested to act as Secretary. Mr. MacRae, upon assuming the Chair, stated the object of the meeting to be to take into consideration matters affecting the general prosperity of this city, and more particularly to take some action in regard to the proposed extension of the Raleigh & Augusta Air-Line Railroad from Hamlet to Charlotte, which, if carried out by the projectors of this road, would seriously affect the commercial interests of Wilmington. The meeting was then declared by the Chair ready for business.

Upon motion of Col. J. W. Atkinson, seconded by Col. Roger Moore, it was resolved that the Chairman of this meeting request the Presidents of the Chamber of Commerce, Produce Exchange and Board of Trade to appoint a committee of three from each of their respective bodies to proceed to Raleigh in the interest of this city, and to represent the interests of Wilmington generally in petitioning the General Assembly for any legislation touching the interests of this particular section of the State. It was further resolved in this connection that the Chairman of this meeting appoint three persons from the citizens at large to constitute a part of this Committee, and also that the Chairman be added to the list, making the number thirteen in all, and that the committee thus constituted be requested to proceed to Raleigh at as early a day as practicable.

A memorial to the legislature was then laid before the meeting by DuBrutz Cutlar, Esq., which requests the repeal of the privilege and purchase tax. The memorial was received by the unanimous vote of the meeting and the signatures of all present were appended to the petition. Upon motion a committee was appointed to carry the memorial around to the different business men of the city who were not present at the meeting for further signatures. There being no further business, upon motion the meeting adjourned.

Special Meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in extra session this afternoon at 4 o'clock to take some action in regard to the proposed extension of the Raleigh and Augusta Air-Line R. R. from Hamlet to Charlotte. This road is but a continuation of the Seaboard and Roanoke Railroad, under another name, which terminates at Portsmouth and is entirely antagonistic to the interests of Wilmington and should be looked after by merchants and real estate owners in this city who do not want the business of this section diverted to Norfolk or Baltimore. Mr. John M. Robinson, the President of the Bay Line from Portsmouth to Baltimore and President of the Seaboard & Roanoke R. R., is also likewise, we think, President of the Raleigh and Augusta Air-Line. In addition to this Mr. Robinson, as President of the S. & R. R. R. was, or is now, the endorser of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad bonds, another connecting link on towards Portsmouth.

B'nai Brith.

The annual session of District Grand Lodge No. 5, Independent Order of B'nai Brith, met in Baltimore Wednesday, and was to have adjourned last night. The District Grand Lodge comprises the States of Maryland, Virginia, Georgia North and South Carolina, and the District of Columbia and numbers thirty-four lodges. The following is the official body of the order at present: M. Hutzler, president; D. S. Stern, first vice-president; L. Levin, second vice-president pro tem; S. B. Wolfe, secretary; L. N. Hirschberg, assistant secretary; A. Goodman, treasurer; Max Cohen, sergeant-at-arms.

We extract the following which will be read with great pleasure and interest by many of our readers:

The president's report, which was presented, dealt chiefly with questions of appeal. The sum of \$2,029.16 was subscribed last fall in aid of brethren suffering from the yellow fever in district No. 7. During the past term charters were granted to two new lodges, one in Danville, Va., and one in Baltimore. The excellent condition of the orphan asylum fund, under the management of Mr. Simon Wolfe, was reported. The sum of \$4,618.85 stands to the credit of the fund, and a policy of \$500 on the life of Simon Wolfe. The report of the general committee showed that during the past year there were 18 deaths in the district. The heirs of 14 brethren were paid \$1,000 each.

The secretary's report shows that the total receipts during the year of the general fund were \$2,604.72, and that the balance on hand on January 1, 1878, after transferring \$487.95 to the endowment fund, was \$608.18. The total expenditures were \$2,586.16, leaving a balance on hand January 1, 1878, of \$521.74. The management of the endowment fund has been very satisfactory. There has been received for assessments during the past year and from balance on hand the sum of \$14,688.09. The sum of \$14,000 has paid to heirs of 14 deceased members, leaving a balance on hand of \$688.09. On January 1, 1879, there was a membership of 2,148. The amount paid for sick benefits during the year was \$1,360.07, for burying the dead \$824.75 for endowment, including sinking fund, \$15,960.40, education of orphans \$1,002, donations \$2,582.66, making a total relief of \$21,675.92. The finance committee reported the financial standing of the Grand Lodge for the year ending December 31, 1878, showing the total fund to be \$18,238.94, and the expenditures \$17,031.11 leaving a balance on hand of \$1,154.84.

The election by the Grand Lodge of Mr. J. I. Macks, of this city, as Second Vice-President of the Fifth District Grand Lodge of the order, and as a member of the Board of Control of the Orphan Asylum Fund of the organization, is a compliment most worthy bestowed and one which is appreciated by the entire community.

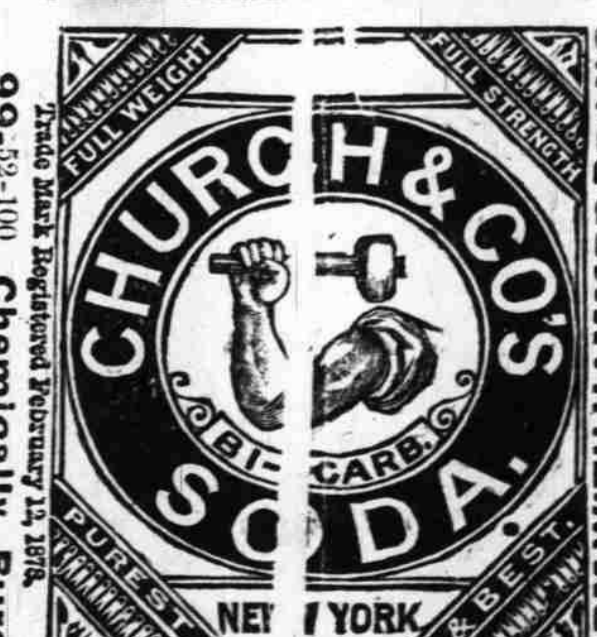
