In Magistrates' Row.

Ristow Broadhurst, colored, was arraigned before Justice Gardner to-day upon the charge of embezzling funds belonging to Wm. Fillpot, colored. The defendant was bound over in the sum of \$100 to the next term of the Criminal Court. S. C. Armstrong, colored, was arraigned before Justice Hall for the larceny of five pounds of meat and a peck of meal from the flat of Charles Bowden, colored. The larceny is alleged to have been committed in Lehigh, where both of the parties in the case hail from. The defendant was bound over in the sum of \$50—justified bond, to the Criminal Court, in default of which he was committed to jail.

Sudden Death—Heart Disease.

Last night about 11 o'clock, Washington Tucker, a middle aged colored man, who lived on a cross street near the suburbs of Brooklyn, died very suddenly of heart disease. Tucker had been to church and after returning home complained of feeling badly and in a few minutes thereafter expired. Special Coroner A. H. Leslie, who has been appointed to serve during Coroner Hewlett's illness, was notified of the death this morning and after summoning a jury repaired to the house in which Tucker died. The verdict of the jury was "death from natural causes, supposed to be heart disease."

Digest of Opinions.

We glean from the Raleigh *News* the following digest of opinions delivered recently in the Supreme Court:

By Smith, C. J.—State vs. Chadbourn from New Hanover.

A firm, which buys timber and converting it into lumber sells it, but which does not buy lumber nor sell timber, are not "traders" and are not subject to the license tax imposed on such by the Revenue Act.

By Smith, C. J.—State vs. James from New Hanover.

Where the party on whose false oath a warrant of arrest in a criminal proceeding was issued accompanied the officer and pointed out the defendant. Held he was as much protected as the officer and is not indictable for assault and battery. The warrant being issued by competent authority no enquiry is admissible into the circumstances under which it was issued. The defendant has a remedy by an action for malicious prosecution.

By Dillard, J.—Kerchner vs. McRae from New Hanover. The general rule that parol testimony is inadmissible to add to, vary or contradict a written contract is restricted to cases in which the parties express in writing the entire stipulations agreed on. Where an issue as to a parol agreement is not objected to, parol evidence tending to prove the same can not be incompetent. It is discretionary with a judge whether he shall interrupt counsel if his remarks are improper or to correct them in his charge to the jury. It is not error to charge a jury in a civil case that they must decide according to the preponderance of the evidence. Executors are responsible in their representative capacity on contracts originating in testator's lifetime, but in cases of action wholly accruing after testator's death they are liable individually.

By Dillard, J.—Kerchner vs. Fairly, from Richmond. Where in a proceeding to foreclose a mortgage it appears that the mortgagor is in receipt of the rents and profits the plaintiff is entitled to have a receiver appointed pending the litigation.

By Dillard, J.—Lew vs. Lew, from Sampson. Where a husband sues for a divorce and the jury finds that he separated from his wife (and not she from him) and that she was guilty of adultery after the separation but not before. Held, he was not entitled to a decree dissolving the marriage.

A Call for a No-Fence Law.

ROCKY POINT, N. C., Jan. 29th, 1879.

ED. REVIEW: "The times are changed and we are changed with them." Things which seemed right in the early settlement of this country now seem wrong. Then timber was plentiful, now it is growing scarce. Hog and cattle range was then good, now "it is not only bad, but very bad indeed." The law compels farmers to maintain "a sufficient fence five feet high," but who does it? none, no, not one. What is the consequence? Why the woods are overstocked with hungry hogs and cattle, which are continually breaking into somebody's crop, causing a fuss between the owner of the crop and the owner of the stock. Would it not be well to abolish the compulsory fence law? 'Tis cheaper to fence in the stock than to fence it out as the fence is worth more than the stock. I know a poor farmer who has 12,600 rails around his farm, and his entire stock consists of one sow and three little pigs. Tell those "Raleigh boys" to give us a no-fence law. We will then have less stock and better stock; more timber and better timber; better crops, more money, better neighbors, and better times.
Print this, and I will tell you something about roads, dogs, &c., before long.
