Kerosene Danger.
 A correspondent mentions a source of danger in the use of kerosene lamps which seems to have been generally overlooked, namely, the habit of allowing lamps to stand near hot stoves, on mantelpieces, and in other places where they become heated sufficiently to convert the oil into gas. Not unfrequently persons engaged in cooking or other work about the stove will stand the lamp on an adjacent mantelpiece, or even on the top of a raised oven; or when ironing will rest the lamp near the stand on which the heated iron rests. Inspection of Timber.
 In the House, on Monday, on motion of Mr. Colwell, the rules were suspended and the bill to change the law in relation to the inspection of timber in Wilmington was taken up and passed. The bill provides that the bill shall contain the gross number of feet and the number of feet measured off or refused on account of defects; inspectors shall not render bill for refuse timber at any price fixed by the buyer without expressed consent of the seller; that timber shall be measured in the middle and calculated at full size of square of the timber at place of measurement and one half the number of feet contained in vane edges to be added to the amount; length of defects to be ascertained by chopping, boring, &c. and the length only of such defects to be refused, and if defect is less than one, third of size of timber then only the number of feet actually lost by reason of said defect to be refused; inspectors violating provisions of this act to be removed from office and disqualified.
Stolen Goods Recovered.
 Last night, about 9 o'clock, officer Costin, of the police force, discovered a bag containing sundry articles of different kinds on the front piazza of his house in Cottage Lane, and not understanding how or why the bag should have been placed there, Mr. Costin allowed it to remain and suspecting that whoever left it would return again, he kept watch until this morning about 2 o'clock, when a tall, sable-hued gentleman (?) passed through the lane, but with keen scent he must have detected something wrong and "smelt a mice" for he did not stop. The bag was carried to the City Hall this morning and emptied, when it was found to contain five pictures, one clock (a valuable eight day clock) one table-cloth and one scarf, all of which were proven to have been stolen from the Cape Fear Military Academy on Chestnut street during the night of the 25th of January, at which time the premises of the above named institution were entered by some thief or thieves and the above named articles purloined.
 The property was all turned over to Professor Agostini, of the Academy, who accepted to the Chief of Police for the same.

The Rope Walker.
 According to announcement by circular hand bills distributed on the streets to-day, on one side of which was an advertisement of some Yankee patent medicine, and on the other that of "Professor" Dare, the rope walker, the above named individual descended the steps leading to the first story of the Empire House, shortly after 1 o'clock to-day, and started in a brisk run across the street to Vollers' corner, from the upper story of which building a rope about six inches in circumference was stretched through a window on Market street to the roof of a building on the opposite side. As soon as the showman presented himself on the street clad in his circus suit of tights, (somewhat like those worn by the Opera Bouffe performers night before last) all the little darkies in the neighborhood gathered in a trot after him. After appearing at the window above mentioned and throwing several ropes to the ground the "Professor" descended to the street and mounting a dry-goods box commenced to make a speech, the sum and substance of which was, that he charged nothing for the performance but proposed to take up a collection, and in order to make sure of the funds he proposed to collect before he performed and to pass around the hat himself. The Professor then trotted up and down the street on either side from Second to Front street with an empty cigar box in his hand, into which he probably gathered about one dollar and fifty cents, in nickels. After this the performance commenced, the rope-walker going through with several antics on the rope such as kneeling on one knee, lying flat on the rope face downwards, lying on his back, walking blind-folded, putting both feet in an empty cheese box and walking on the rope in this way, walking backwards, and so forth. There were probably some two thousand people on the street in that vicinity gazing up at the man who was running the risk of breaking his neck, and among them we noticed a good many people who never go to the theatre because it is too immoral to witness such performances.
