## Habeas Corpus Case.

His Honor Judge Meares, of the Criminal Court, this morning issued a warrant to the Sheriff commanding him to bring before him at Chambers this afternoon, at 4 o'clock, J. C. Hill, J. P., with all the papers in the case of Oscar Lingiose, alias Austin Landen, and Andrew Massen alias Andrew Morris, tried before said J. C. Hill, J. P., on the 6th day of February upon a bail warrant wherein W. J. Penton was plaintiff in the case.

In the case above referred to the defendants were committed for trial until the 21st day of February, whereupon they sued out a writ of habeas corpus to have cause shown why they should be detained in prison without a trial at once.

## Col. Duncan K. McRae's Lecture.

One of the highest compliments ever tendered to a public lecturer of any kind in the city of Wilmington was shown to Col. MacRae last night by the large audience which filled the Opera House to listen to the thrilling eloquence of this distinguished gentleman, for the second time within a week, upon the subject of "Genius and Talent." But as we have published an extended notice of the lecture on a previous occasion, we deem it unnecessary to make a repetition of it to-day. Suffice it to say, that the whole audience were charmed almost beyond their expectation and were carried along in a perfect maze of delight by the matchless eloquence and genius of the gifted lecturer.
