French Cream Cake.

Captured.

Peter Coleman, colored, one of the two who conspired to "strike down the guard," at the House of Correction on Sunday morning, was yesterday captured about five miles South of Magnolia. Coleman in making good his escape swam the river. He was sentenced to three years imprisonment during the last term of the Criminal Court on the charge of false pretences.

At the City Treasurer's Office.

A baker's dozen of delinquents called at the Treasurer's office this morning and took a receipt from that official after paying over the requisite amount against them on the books. Warrants have been issued alphabetically up to noon as far down as the letter H. This afternoon those whose initials commence with this letter, if they are on the delinquent list, may expect to be waited on by a gentleman clad in gray.
The receipts at the City Treasurer's office this week, thus far, foot up about \$2,500; of this amount \$1,500 have been received from the license tax.

The Custom House Reduction.

Orders having been received at the Custom House in this city some week or ten days ago to reduce the force on duty here, the Collector of Customs, W. P. Canaday, Esq., submitted the matter to the six officials who are acting as Inspectors, and from whom the reduction would be made and permitted them to decide for themselves as to who should walk the plank.

But as the order was only to be enforced for six months the parties interested concluded to divide the matter up into two months each. The first two months, Kennedy and Mabson have gone into retirement; after that time they are to be reinstated and two more will step out and so on until the six months shall have expired. Quite a shrewd idea that.

Reception of Mrs. Gregory's Remains.

The remains of Mrs. Dorah Gregory, deceased wife of W. H. H. Gregory, Esq., arrived here by a special train from Charlotte this morning at 11:25 o'clock and were met at the depot by a large number of the friends of the family together with the Wilmington Light Infantry Company, of which the deceased, though a lady, was yet a recognized member, having acted as *vivandiere*, wearing a dress of the shade and trimmings of the uniform of the Company on several occasions in the days long ago when she was yet Miss Dorah Brown, and quite a wee little miss at that. The cortege formed and preceded by the military, the remains were escorted to the residence of Mr. John E. Lippitt, brother-in-law of the deceased lady, where they will remain until the hour announced for the funeral to-morrow afternoon.

We noticed in the procession, acting as Color Guard, Col. Edward Cantwell and Captain Henry Savage; the former the first Captain and the latter the last Captain the Company ever had, prior to its reorganization since the war.

THE FORGERY.

Officers on the Track—The Accused Forger's Route and His Excuse for Leaving Town.

It is seldom that a Southern newspaper is called upon to chronicle a forgery, absconding cashier, or larceny of any kind among the white residents, but it is our duty to day as a journalist to "write up" a forgery committed by a young man who is a resident of this city.

While we exceedingly deplore the circumstance and would abstain from giving publicity to the matter, our duty is plain and we cannot shrink from the performance of it.

On Saturday last John H. Craig, who was employed by Mr. Geo. D. Parsley, at the Hilton Rice Mills, forged Mr. Parsley's name to a check for \$27.91. About 10 o'clock on the night referred to young Craig presented the forged check to Capt. James M. McGowan, Superintendent of the Mozart Saloon, and asked that it be cashed, stating that it was given him by Mr. Parsley in part payment of his wages.

THE CHECK WAS CASHED
And young Craig after treating several of his friends and acquaintances left the bar and soon became involved in an altercation with a porter of the Empire House, who rolled him around on the floor.

ON SUNDAY
The alleged forger was noticed riling around the town in a livery buggy and near evening he hauled up at the house of a *demi monde* where he treated and spent much more money than was his custom. Later in the day he

ROBBED THE TILL
At the rice mills of the change that was in it. Monday morning Capt. McGowan presented the check at both banks where payment was refused, the officers pronouncing it

A BOGUS CHECK
Mr. Parsley was notified and denied any knowledge of it and pronounced the signature a forgery.

MONDAY EVENING
Young Craig was seen by the bridge-keeper at Hilton to be making rapid strides in the direction of the Bluff. Tuesday while the passenger train of the Carolina Central Railway was standing at Marlville, twenty-six miles from this city, the

ACCUSED FORGER
Boarded the train and remarked to Capt. Everett that he had gotten into trouble at Wilmington with a negro at the Empire House and as a warrant had been served on him at Parsley's mill he thought it best

TO LEAVE.
Upon the arrival of the train at Laurinburg, young Craig got off and went direct to a boarding house. Capt. McGowan, hearing of his whereabouts, this morning telegraphed to

LAURINBURG
to have him arrested, and that Special Deputy Sheriff Strode, would be up tomorrow morning for the man. A report was in circulation on yesterday among some of the officers of the law that

CRAIG WAS IN TOWN,
but the above shows that he was not, and that the limbs of the law were off of his track.

The Contested Election Case.
We publish the following decision of the Supreme Court in relation to the Brunswick county contested election case as of interest to our many readers on the other side of the Cape Fear. The decision involves vital interests and may be of much benefit as a guide in future action:

Swain vs. McRae, from Brunswick, judgement affirmed.

This was an action brought against the board of canvassers to compel them to reassemble and make a recount of the vote cast for Superior Court Clerk in Brunswick county, including the rejected return from Town Creek township. His Honor refused the writs of injunction and mandamus, and declined to enquire into the merits of the case on the ground that the writ of mandamus is not the proper remedy, and for the further reason that, in the opinion of the court, the board of county canvassers, created by law for a single specific purpose, which has been accomplished, has ceased to exist as an organic body, and its members are no longer competent to do an official act.

Held, The office of the writ of mandamus is simply to impose upon an official the execution of a neglected duty affecting the interest or rights of the person applying for it. It cannot be extended to reach conflicting claims to an office and thus usurp the place of that special and ample remedy (*quo warranto*) which the law prescribes for adjusting and determining them.

The court thinks it unnecessary to decide the other point, as it is not material to the decision of this action.

Legislative Enactments Relating to the City of Wilmington.

We give below the act recently passed by the General Assembly authorizing the issue by the city of Wilmington of bonds to the amount of \$200,000 to enable the city to pay its present bonded indebtedness, and also the act by which the present Mayor and Board of Aldermen are continued in office for a term of two years longer:

AN ACT RELATING TO THE CITY OF WILMINGTON.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION 1. That the persons who may be in office as Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Wilmington on the 26th day of March, A. D., 1879, shall continue in office until the regular election to be held in pursuance of an act of the General Assembly entitled, "An act to organize a government for the city of Wilmington," ratified the 6th day of March, A. D., 1877 on the fourth Thursday of March, A. D., 1881, and until their successor then to be elected shall be duly qualified.

SEC 2. All laws coming in conflict with the provision of this act are hereby repealed.

SEC 3. This Act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Ratified the 27th day of February, A. D. 1879.

"AN ACT,
To enable the city of Wilmington to pay its present bonded indebtedness, and to provide for its bonds maturing in the years 1879 and 1880."

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SEC 1. That for the purpose of paying such bonds and coupons of the city of Wilmington as are now due, and also such as shall mature and become due during the years 1879 and 1880, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the said city, by and with the sanction and approval of "the Board of Audit and Finance of the city of Wilmington," are hereby authorized and empowered to issue coupon bonds bearing interest, payable semi-annually at a rate not exceeding six per cent, per annum, to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars, in denominations of not less than one hundred dollars or more than one thousand dollars, to be made payable as follows, to wit: Fifty thousand dollars on the 1st of January 1897; fifty thousand dollars on the 1st of January 1899; fifty thousand dollars on the 1st of January 1901; and fifty thousand dollars on the 1st of January 1904, with a provision that the same may be called in and paid at any time after the expiration of ten years from the date of issue. Said bond shall be made payable at such places as the said Board may determine, and shall not be valid unless signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Chairman of said Board of Audit and Finance of the city of Wilmington.

SEC 2. The said bonds shall be sold and exchanged at par, and at no less a rate; they shall not be taxable by the said city for any purpose whatsoever, and the coupons shall be receivable from and after maturity in payment of any and all taxes or other indebtedness, due the said city.

SEC 3. The said bonds shall be registered at the option of their holders, by the treasurer of said city, and after such registration shall be transferred only by endorsement.

SEC 4. All Executors, Administrators, Guardians, Trustees and other persons acting in a fiduciary capacity, who now hold, or may hereafter hold, or become possessed of any of the bonds or coupons of said city which are now due or may become due during the years 1879 and 1880 are hereby authorized and empowered to exchange the same for bonds issued under this act.

SEC 5. Any officer or employe of the said city, who shall apply the proceeds of any bond or bonds issued under this act, or exchange any such, in any other manner or for any other purpose, than is hereby provided shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars or more than five hundred dollars, or be imprisoned not less than one month or more than six months, or both at the discretion of the court.

Ratified the 14th day of March, A. D., 1879.
