Board of Aldermen.

The Board met at the City Hall, last evening, pursuant to the call of the Mayor.

The Clerk read the act of the Legislature continuing the present Mayor and Board of Aldermen in office for the period of two years.

Bid of James D. D. y, for removing night soil, was presented and accepted.

The question of appropriations for the ensuing year was then considered, and the total amount was fixed at \$50,000.

The Board re-enacted the General Tax Ordinance of last year, except the tax on Express Companies, which was reduced from \$50 to \$40 per month.

The following Standing Committees were then appointed: Finance and Expenditures—The Mayor Aldermen VonGlabn and Fester.

Police Department—The Mayor, Aldermen Volders and Bowden. Streets and Wharves—The Mayor Alderman Bowden and Volders.

Public Buildings—Aldermen Myers VonGlabn and Hill. Fire Department—Aldermen Bowden, Flanner and Lowrey.

Light Department—Aldermen Flanner, Volders and King. Markets and Fees—Aldermen VonGlabn, Myers and Hill.

Ordinance from W. L. Smith. Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, was received, and referred to the Finance Committee, with power to act.

Communication from L. M. Williams, Clerk of the Market, was referred to the Committee on Ordinances.

Communication from F. M. James, Health Officer, was referred to the Committee on Sanitary Department.

William H. Banks was granted the use of the City Hall for the purpose of holding a festival, on the evening of the 9th inst., the city to pay for the gas.

No further business appearing, the Board then adjourned.
