A Sorrowful Anniversary.

This is the anniversary of the first battle of the Wilderness, fought on the 2d day of May, 1863, and the skirmish battle tha was preliminary to the grand contest at Chancellorsville, which took place on the following day, Sunday, the 3d of May. It was in this great engagement or the plan for it that the Napoleonic genius of the great Stonewall was more apparent proba bly than in any of his many brilliant and successful military achievements during his short career. With a greatly inf rior force General Jackson manœuvered and out witted the Federal General Hocker to such an extent, with a small portion of his command, as 'o make his antagonist believe that Lee's army was in full retreat towards Richmond, while in very fact Jackson with most of his corps was making rapid strides for the rear of Hooker's army, which he succeeded in reaching about 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the 2d of May, and at 5.30 o'clock, the great chieftain had so disposed of his command as to move forward in three lines of battle to the attack. Imagine the surprise and consternation of the enemy and the detailed coks who were cooking their day's ratious for the 'On to Richmond Army" away in the rear, to re. ceive an attack in that quarter from the enemy whom their commander had teleg aphed to Washington as being in full retreat towards Richmond.

The victory for the Confederates was overwhelming and darkness alone prevented Jackson from annihilating or capturing Hooker's en ire army. 'They conquered, but Bozurris fe'l, bleeding at every

It was indeed a victory dearly bought by the Confederates, for on that eventful night, sixteen years ago, Stonewall Jackson. in attempting a reconnoisance of the enemy's position received the wounds which teru insted his earthly career, and caused the light of the Confederacy to flicker and wane and finally to go out in utter dark-
