D. has been appointed by the ladies of Memorial Association as Chaplain.

A Sorrowful Anniversary.

This is the anniversary of the first battle of the Wilderness, fought on the 22d day of May, 1863, and the skirmish battle that was preliminary to the grand contest at Chancellorsville, which took place on the following day, Sunday, the 3d of May. It was in this great engagement or the plan for it that the Napoleonic genius of the great Stonewall was more apparent probably than in any of his many brilliant and successful military achievements during his short career. With a greatly inferior force General Jackson maneuvered and outwitted the Federal General Hooker to such an extent, with a small portion of his command, as to make his antagonist believe that Lee's army was in full retreat towards Richmond, while in very fact Jackson with most of his corps was making rapid strides for the rear of Hooker's army, which he succeeded in reaching about 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the 2d of May, and at 5:30 o'clock, the great chieftain had disposed of his command as to move forward in three lines of battle to the attack. Imagine the surprise and consternation of the enemy and the detailed looks who were cooking their day's rations for the "On to Richmond Army" away in the rear, to receive an attack in that quarter from the enemy whom their commander had telegraphed to Washington as being in full retreat towards Richmond.

The victory for the Confederates was overwhelming and darkness alone prevented Jackson from annihilating or capturing Hooker's entire army. They conquered, but Bozaris fell, bleeding at every vein.

It was indeed a victory dearly bought by the Confederates, for on that eventful night, sixteen years ago, Stonewall Jackson, in attempting a reconnaissance of the enemy's position received the wounds which terminated his earthly career, and caused the light of the Confederacy to flicker and wane and finally to go out in utter darkness.

The Northeast River.

The water in the Northeast river has been unusually low, and our friend Capt. Biaby, of the steamer *Clinton*, was detained nearly a day on that account, on his last passage down. The recent rains, however have swelled the stream, and there is now good boating water.

Military Drills.

We learn that the Wilmington Light Infantry and the Whiting Rifles are having regular drills every night, preparatory to the parade on Memorial Day. Several new members have been admitted to the ranks of each company within the past few weeks, and it may be expected that both companies will turn out on that occasion with full ranks.

The New Cisterns.

Capt. R. S. Radcliffe, the contractor, began work day before yesterday on the first of the new fire cisterns to be constructed by him, which is located at the corner of Fifth and Chestnut streets, and which is to hold 600 barrels. The work is progressing rapidly, the sides, which are of pressed brick, being already raised some two feet above the foundations. When this is completed Capt. Radcliffe will go to work on that to be built on the corner of Third and Mulberry streets, which is to be of 400 barrels capacity.

The Mail Robbers.

James Davis and Charles Williams, the two colored individuals who, Davis claims, robbed the U. S. mails while in transit from one train to another at Charleston, were taken from jail and carried to-day before U. S. Commissioner, McQuigg. Davis persists in the statement as contained in the affidavit we have heretofore referred to. The defendants were held in default of bonds of \$500, to await the orders of the Judge at the District Court to be held here next week, when they will probably be sent to Charleston for trial in the district where the offense is alleged to have occurred. Nobody knows as yet anything relative to the robbery, which can hardly be that which was investigated yesterday, but the defendants will be accommodated with a full hearing of the case.

May Day with the Colored People.

The colored people of this city held a picnic at Hilton yesterday, at which there were games of base-ball, walking matches, dancing and lots of other kinds of fun of the most pleasant kind, with no drunkenness or fighting to mar the festivities of the occasion, and the sports of the day terminated as orderly and peaceably as could be desired. The match game of base-ball was between the 'Red Stockings,' composed of men, and the 'Wilmington Mutual,' composed of boys, and was well-contested, both nines playing with energy and skill. The game was to have consisted of ten innings, for a prize of a new bat to the winner. At the conclusion of the ninth inning, however, the 'Red Stockings' concluded to yield the prize to the 'Mutuals,' without playing. The score stood at the close of the ninth inning, 'Red Stockings,' 11; 'Mutuals,' 10. As the game was left in that condition, both sides may very appropriately claim the victory.
