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## VIEW AND REVIEWS.

General Robinson, chairman of the Republican executive committee of Ohio, only claims the State by 35,000 majority. The Democratic papers want to know why he doesn't make it an even 50,000.

Henry Ward Beecher, writing from Pittsburgh while on his way to lecture for \$350 a night, complacently says: "Here are hundreds of men who live on a dollar a day, and lay up something every year."

The opponents of the new California constitution take comfort in the belief that its objectionable provisions are so directly in conflict with the Constitution that it will prove a practical nullity when tested in the courts.

The writer of a letter in the London Times points out that an ounce of bread wasted daily in each household in England and Wales means about 25,000,000 quarter loaves, the produce of 30,000 acres of wheat in a year; while an ounce a week of meat wasted amounts to some 300,000 sheep.

The daily circulation of the most popular newspaper in the City of Mexico, with a population of 200,000, does not exceed 2,000 copies. All the newspapers in the republic aggregate a consumption of only about 800 reams a month, a quantity that many single mills in the United States could supply, and yet not run a fourth of the time.

The London World says a female herring lays about 30,000 eggs, and if 100 couples of herrings were allowed without restriction to multiply their kind for a period of seven years the seas and great rivers of this kingdom would become so full of herrings that no ship would be able to sail upon them. It used to be thought that whitebait were only to be found in the Thames; now we know better. The fish can be procured in all the friths and bays which are frequented by the herring of the sprat.

Russia seems to have the highest death rate of any country that collects mortality statistics. The report of the Medical Bureau for the year 1877 has but recently been published, and it shows that in a population of eighty millions, the deaths of the year were at the rate of from thirty to fifty per thousand. The ravages of diphtheria put it first in the list of diseases; next comes typhoid fever, and next small-pox. There are about 14,000,000 sectarians in Russia who do not allow vaccination, and this accounts for the large mortality from small-pox. As to the typhoid, it is called in Russia 'hunger typhus,' for its greatest ravages are always in the famine-stricken districts.

There are attempts to limit the opium traffic in California. The Grass Valley Trustees have passed an ordinance imposing a license of \$30 per quarter upon opium sellers, drug stores exempted. The Sacramento Bee thinks this is wrong, and that opium dens ought to be prohibited, not licensed. On this subject the San Francisco State says: "There is great danger that the use of this deadly drug may be added to the list of our body and soul destroying vices. The intensity of life here, its excitement, strain, and disappointment, the large proportion of our people who are separated from home influences, and the practical materialism which is becoming the prevailing religion, render this a community in which the habit could easily be introduced."

The Washington Star says all the Potomac fishermen admit that there has been more fish caught this year than last, but the prices for both shad and herring have ranged much lower. He, being now selling from \$5 to \$6 per thousand, and shad from \$8 to \$10 per hundred, which is considerably below last year's prices. This, it is said, is not so much due to the abundance of supply as to the scarcity of money, and the general stagnation of business. Farmers from Maryland and Virginia, who formerly used to send their four and six horse teams from twenty to fifty miles for a load of herring packed in coarse salt, several thousand in a load, sufficient to last their slaves for a year, now purchase but a few hundred, having but few hands to feed, and generally less money to spend than formerly.

George III was fond of boiled mutton and turnips and apple dumpling. His chief drink was a cup composed of a quart of lemonade to one glass of wine. Like Napoleon, he ate with fierce rapidity. The favorite dish of George IV was thick soup of crayfish. He liked occasionally liver and bacon, and tripe and onions. He latterly drank great quantities of liqueurs, especially black cherry brandy, which he took as a tonic for digestion weakened by years of Curacao punch. Roast fowl and roast beef were the delicacies of William IV, and sherry his wine, which he drank from a black bottle. Queen Victoria likes cock-a-leekie soup, a rich extract often cooked for her by her

daughter, Princess Christian, who is a most admirable cook, and loves port wine.

## AMERICAN JEWS IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

We clip from the telegraphic dispatches the following proceedings in the United States Senate on Friday, the 16th inst.:

WASHINGTON, May 16.—A Sub-Committee on Foreign Affairs, of which Mr. King, of Louisiana, is Chairman, was appointed to-day to draw up suitable resolutions to be submitted to the House in regard to the treatment of American Jews in foreign countries, demanding they be placed on an equal footing with other United States citizens, etc.

And we ask, why in the name of all that is reasonable, and decent, and humane, and consistent with our institutions, should they not have all the protection, all the rights and all the immunities which are guaranteed to any other class of American citizens, whether naturalized or native born? Or, rather, why have they ever been debarred from all those rights and privileges? Is the government of these United States so weak as not to be able to protect its citizens while in foreign lands, or is it so given up to the spirit of religious intolerance as to be regardless of the peril to which a certain class may be exposed, simply because of a religious belief? We hope not.

What nation so great in all the majesty and glory of to-day, as was the Jewish nation thousands of years before the child Jesus was born in Nazareth? So far advanced were they in the science of architecture, that at the building of Solomon's Temple, an edifice which has never been equalled in extent or magnificence, the timbers were all prepared in the forests of Lebanon and stones were all fitted ready for use in the quarries, "so that there was neither hammer, nor axe, nor any tool of iron, heard in the house while it was in building." [First Kings, vi-7v.]

The history of the Jews, while they occupied a position among the nations of the earth, is one of awe-inspiring grandeur. Scattered throughout the four quarters of the globe, and oppressed everywhere, they successfully ply their various vocations in nearly every populous city and thriving village in the world. Kingdoms and thrones are upheld and kept from tottering to their ruin by the power of Jewish duceats. They furnish the material by which wars are conducted or peace is consummated, while many of those who invoke their aid treat them with contumely, scorn and indignity. The same profound learning, indomitable energy and persevering industry which made the nation the proudest and most powerful in the days of David and Solomon, are distinguishing traits in the race to-day, while the same undying hope which sustained them during the Babylonian captivity gives them strength to patiently endure all the wrongs and persecutions to which they have been or may be subjected. Their entire history from the most remote period to the present is interesting and instructive.

But aside from every other consideration, the laws of this country guarantee to all its citizens, whether made so by accident of birth or by adoption, the fullest and most complete protection, regardless of religious opinions. It grants to every citizen the right to worship God as conscience may dictate. All the rights of citizenship which a man may exercise while in a foreign country have the same force and demand the same protecting care from this government, whether he be Jew or Gentile. There is no discrimination known before the law, and common justice, common decency and national integrity and honor, demand that there should be none, in fact. It is a foul blot on the escutcheon of the country if any citizen should be allowed to suffer an indignity, while abroad, from which his rights of citizenship guarantee him protection. The Jewish race inhabit every city and thriving town in the United States. They are a thrifty people. Many of them are wealthy, and they contribute to the national prosperity and wealth as much in proportion to their numbers as any other portion of our population. They donate liberally for purposes of charity and humanity. As a class they are educated, intelligent, law-abiding and peace-loving citizens. They foster every enterprise which tends to national prosperity, wealth, honor, influence and power. We are Christians, but we honor and venerate the history and traditions of that race. As citizens they are entitled to all the rights which we possess in accordance with the spirit and genius of our institutions. Our government has its representatives located among the different nations of the East whose duty it is to see that our citizens are all protected in their just rights. Has any one suffered through official neglect of duty in affording this protection? If so, then let the official who has permitted the wrong be punished and the nation which has inflicted it be compelled to make a full and complete reparation.

## INCREASE IN IMMIGRATION.

There is, says the New York Mercantile Review, a marked increase in immigration. One steamer, which arrived last week, brought 759 immigrants—the largest number, with a single exception, arriving by one steamer since 1869. This and other arrivals are only drops of the coming flood. The emigrant societies, branches in Norway and Sweden report that unusual preparations are making for a Scandinavian movement in this direction. There is also expected a large influx of emigrants from Ireland and England, where thousands of mill-operatives declare that being unable to make a living, they must emigrate. Emigration companies are forming also in Southern Germany, where much distress prevails. Thousands of Russian Mennonites are also expected to emigrate to the United States during the year, owing to the fact that a Russian edict has been promulgated which compels them to do military duty after 1880. Probably our population from foreign sources will be increased before the close of the year by at least 100,000.
