

IN CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, May.—The Senate took up the bill making subsidiary coins exchangeable for lawful money of the United States, and to make such coins a legal tender in sums up to twenty dollars.

The morning hour having expired, the bill went over without action; and the Senate took up the Contagious Disease bill.

After remarks from several Senators, it was reported back to the Senate and the amendments made in Committee of the Whole were agreed to. It was then read the third time and passed.

The Senate then took up the bill relative to the transportation of animals, but without action, went into Executive session, and afterwards adjourned until Monday.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Atkins, of Tennessee, from the committee on appropriations, reported back the Senate amendments to the Legislative Appropriation bill, and said that he was instructed to move concurrence in all of them. It was hardly necessary, he said, to give the reason for that instruction. There were some of the amendments in which the committee would not, under other circumstances, concur, for instance, the increase of salaries of Senate officials from twenty to one hundred per cent more than the salaries of some of the corresponding employes of the House.

The Silver bill was resumed, and up to a late hour is still under consideration.

Animated filibustering practices are in operation by the Republicans.

The House has been filibustering nearly all the afternoon and evening.

The ninth and last section of the Silver bill is under discussion.

The opposition to the previous question was made on the Republican side on the ground that that would preclude the offering of amendments tomorrow. The Democrats, however, insisted that the bill should be advanced to the point where the vote could be taken in favor of its passage.

Calls of the House followed, and after several roll calls on dilatory motions, the Sergeant-at-Arms appeared at the bar of the House with twenty-one members in custody. The usual noisy and amusing scene took place when the delinquent members were called upon to clear excuses for absence, the favorite excuse seeming to be "pangs of the ger."

At midnight the House is vigorously pressing filibustering tactics, with no indications of an early adjournment.

GENERAL EUROPEAN NEWS.

Fighting the Turks in Thessaly.—The English Rowers—Bismarck's Speech on the Corn Duties—American Cattles.

LONDON, May 23.—A despatch to the Post from Berlin states that Russia is about to add a number of swift cruisers to her fleet.

The Post's correspondent at Berlin reports that Germany and France are co-operating heartily on the Greek question.

The government has refused to give a day for further debate in the House of Commons on the second reading of the Irish Rulers bill.

The home rulers in the House of Commons have chosen as their leader Mr. William Saaw, member for the county of Cork, in the place of the late Mr. Isaac Butt.

The weights for the Ascot Stakes have been published. Parole has been handicapped at 8 st 13 lbs, which is 4 lbs heavier than the weight to be carried by any other horse.

The Times' Vienna despatch says it is announced from Constantinople that Khairaddin Pacha, the Grand Vizier, has tendered his resignation, as certain rivalries have been very active lately. Should a change be effected it is believed that it will be a far reaching one.

A Vienna despatch to the St Petersburg Golos states that Germany, not Russia, demanded that Switzerland renounce the right of asylum to foreign refugees. Switzerland refused, and Germany referred the question to the other Powers, who refused to co-operate with Germany.

An official despatch has been received at Athens by the Greek Minister of War announcing that an engagement has taken place between the Turkish troops and insurgents at Perlezia, Thessaly. The Turks lost 450 men in killed and wounded, and the insurgents 70 men, including their leaders.

The block in the Liverpool cattle delivery is due to the backwardness of the lairage and slaughtering accommodations. A portion of the Wallasey dock sheds, on the Birkenhead side of the Mersey, is still unaccepted by the Privy Council. The Morpeth dock sheds, Birkenhead, and the Canada dock sheds, at Liverpool, are incomplete. The action of the Privy Council in scheduling dogs has added to the difficulty. One vessel in the Wallasey dock and two in the river are unable to discharge their cargoes. Three others are due which will also be without accommodations.

The schedule on the W N C R R will change to take effect Monday 26th inst. Trains will pass and dine at Hickory.

In the Corn Law Resolution on Wednesday Prince Bismarck made a two hours' speech in support of the grain duties. He strove to show that the imposition of the duties by bettering the course of the agricultural class would give an impetus to industrial activity in England, France, Belgium, and the Netherlands. He cited in proof thereof the Prince's disclaimer of intention of seeking to increase the tariff on wheat by the corn tax. All he desired was to do justice to the long suffering countrymen by removing to the frontier, in the form of a consumption duty, a part of the direct taxes. The debate was adjourned until Friday. The government's proposals will probably be adopted. The landed interest is now urging protection of wool.

The match between Plaisted and Nicholson has not yet been ratified, because the latter's oaker is temporarily absent. At Newcastle both Elliott and Hanlan are out twice daily. Plaisted accompanies Hanlan. To-day (Thursday) Hanlan traversed the course, doing the greater part at 34 strokes a minute. In the afternoon, on the return journey from Elswick to Soots wood, he did 33 to 34 against the stream. He was about one hundred yards ahead of Plaisted when sighted.

CAROLINA.

Raleigh News: Person street revival accomplished much good, no less than eighty-two conversions were the result of the work.

The cadets of the Bingham School have issued invitations for a hop at the McAdoe House, Greensboro, on Monday evening, June 24th.

Kings' Journal: Mrs. Fushee, the blind Quakeress, is holding a revival in the M. E. Church at La Grange. We learn there were about 40 penitents Monday.

Wilson Advance: Dr. John T. Wash, of Kinston, N. C., one of the ablest divines in the State preached in the Disciples Church in this place on Sunday last to a large and intelligent audience. He will be with us again the 3d Sunday in June.

Raleigh Observer: The hotel at Morehead City, N. C., has been purchased by W. B. Wiggins and J. E. Davis, of Wilson, N. C. They intend making it a first class watering place. The sale was made to them by Martin Maddox, of Staunton, Va.

Greensboro Patriot: The vote on \$20,000 appropriation to the Mt. Airy road, in Mt. Airy Township last Thursday resulted in 401 for to 56 against. With such a spirit as this along the line it would not be long before that road would be an accomplished fact.

Greensboro Patriot: The gross earnings of the Chesler & Lenoir Narrow Gauge railroad last year amounted to \$32,000, expenses \$20,000. The indebtedness of the road amounts to \$140,000. The company proposes to issue \$300,000 first mortgage bonds and pay this off.

Charlotte Observer: Mr. George K. Tate, of the firm of Tate Bros., owners and operators of the Mountain Island Cotton Factory, in Gaston county, was in the city yesterday on the way North to purchase two hundred additional looms for the factory. A little over a year ago this factory began to operate looms, keeping seventy-six running constantly.

Newbern Nut Shell: Rev. Mr. McPherson delivered an able and earnest discourse to a very large congregation in New street Methodist Church last night. There were present representatives from nearly all of the denominations in this city, many of whom took a deep interest in the good work going on in the Church. A deep feeling pervaded the assembly throughout the services, and in response to an invitation, a large number knelt for prayers, and there were several penitents among those who have heretofore held aloof. A vast amount of good has already been done since the commencement of the revival and the indications last night showed that much more will yet be accomplished.

The arrangements have been completed whereby a controlling interest in the Kudisill Mine, near this city, passes into the hands of a New York company, who have also purchased a part of the Duffie Mine, in Gaston county. The management of these properties has now passed into the hands of Mr. W. I. Smart, of Boston, a mining expert, who has had fifteen years experience in his business, principally in the most extensive mines of California. It is said that Mr. Smart has a high opinion of North Carolina as a gold-bearing field. He is satisfied that one day will come when her mines will yield untold wealth, and that it will come, too, as soon as the proper methods of working them are put into operation.
