The Camp-Meeting.
The *Isis* returned here this noon pretty well crowded from stem to stern with the last of those who have been at the colored camp-meeting, held some miles below the city. They were all happy, of course, and came to the wharf singing, where they were received with welcoming shouts by those who were on shore. The crowd was large, but not so large, it seems to us, as it was last year.

North Carolina Press Association.
The seventh annual convention of the North Carolina Press Association will convene at Beaufort, at the Atlantic Hotel, on Wednesday, July 16th. The annual address will be delivered by Colonel John D. Cameron, of the Hillsboro Recorder, and Mr. Clem. Manly, of the Newbern Nut Shell, will read the poem on the occasion. It is expected that this will be the largest meeting of the Press ever held in the State.

Mr. B. L. Perry, the proprietor of the Atlantic Hotel, has kindly extended an invitation to the members of the Press to become his guests during their sojourn in Beaufort, and has made arrangements with the boatmen to transport members to and from Morehead City free of charge.

The Regatta.
The fleet of the Carolina Yacht Club comprising the *Rosa*, *Ripple*, *Relta*, *Bonnie Lassie*, *Annie*, *Gipsy*, *Leslie* and *Restless* have now arrived in port, the latter reaching here this morning, preparatory to taking part in the annual regatta of the club which takes place at 3 o'clock p. m. on Thursday, the 29th inst. The yachts have all been thoroughly overhauled and put in complete condition for the occasion, and if the wind and weather prove favorable an exciting race may be expected. The course to be sailed is from the foot of Market street, to the buoy opposite the "Dram Tree" and return and repeat making a distance of eight miles. The prize to the winning yacht will be the Olympic flag, now worn by the *Rosa*, and other prizes the nature of which we have not yet ascertained.

TRYING TO CHEAT THE GALLOWES.

Desperate Attempt of Jack Davis to Escape from Smithville Jail, where he is Confined Under Sentence to be Hung on the 11th of July for the Murder of McDuffy.

Jack Davis, colored, who, at the last term of Brunswick Superior Court was sentenced to be hanged on the 11th day of July, next, for the murder of McDuffy, made a desperate attempt this morning to escape from the jail at Smithville in which he is confined and was so far successful as to get out, but was soon recaptured when about half a mile from the village. It seems that the jailor, Mr. J. D. Davis, had gone into the jail and had closed the lower door after him while he went up stairs Jack, taking advantage of a moment when the jailor was attending to some of his duties in the cell jumped out and closed the door, thus locking the jailor in. Mr. Davis, the jailor, then shouted and told his wife not to open the other door, but she misunderstood him and unlocked it when Jack rushed past her and made for the woods. In a moment or two Mr. Davis was also at liberty and gave such hot chase that Jack was soon overtaken. Finding himself about to be recaptured, Jack seized a big fence rail and showed fight, but Mr. Davis had also prepared himself with the same kind of weapon and succeeding in getting in the first blow, knocking the prisoner down, and caught him by the throat and choked him into submission when he was secured and brought back to his old quarters, where he will probably remain until he is led out to pay the penalty of a violated law.

Very much praise is due to Mr. Davis for his prompt and energetic action in the matter. The prisoner is described as a desperate character, and without a doubt had the jailor failed in striking the first blow effectually, he would have been killed.

Criminal Court.

The Jury were then empanelled by the Clerk, after which His Honor delivered his charge which together with swearing in witnesses consumed the entire forenoon and the Court adjourned at 10 o'clock until half past 2 this afternoon.
At the time above mentioned the Judge took his seat again and the docket was taken up. The first case called was State vs. S. A. Richardson, charged with perjury, which was on trial at time of closing our report.

The advertising patronage is put down as paying about \$5,000 annually and there is now due from subscription some \$11,000. The terms of sale will be one-third cash and balance in one and two years, with 8 per cent interest.

PROCEEDINGS IN MEMORY OF COL. WM. S. DEYANE.

KENANSVILLE, Duplin County, N. C., May 21st, 1879.

On Tuesday, the 20th instant, just before the adjournment of Court, Col. W. A. Allen announced to the members of the bar the death of our distinguished and esteemed brother, Wm. S. Devane, and suggested that a meeting be held in respect to his memory, whereupon His Honor, A. S. Seymour, Judge presiding, appointed 3 o'clock p. m. on Wednesday as the time for the meeting.

Accordingly, on Wednesday, at the time appointed, the members of the bar and many citizens of Duplin met in the Court House.
Bro. J. L. Stewart, of Clinton, arose and stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of paying a tribute of respect to the memory of Col. Wm. S. Devane, and in order to better organize the meeting, moved that Col. W. A. Allen be called to the chair.

Upon taking the chair Col. Allen made a few appropriate and feeling remarks.
Mr. O. H. Allen then moved that brethren Jno. D. Stanford and J. T. Bland be requested to act as Secretaries.

Mr. E. W. Kerr moved that the Chair man appoint a committee of five to draw up and report suitable resolutions.
The Chairman appointed brethren E. W. Kerr, J. L. Stewart, Swift Galloway, O. H. Allen and A. G. Ricard.

After retiring for a short time the committee returned and through their Chairman reported the following:
Whereas, in the Providence of an All Wise God death has removed from among us our highly esteemed friend and brother, Wm. S. Devane.

Therefore resolved:
I. That in his death the legal profession has lost one of its most honored, ablest, and most faithful members, society one of its purest and brightest ornaments, his country a tried and true patriot and one of her most worthy citizens, and his family a most affectionate and devoted husband and father.

II. That as we loved and honored him while he lived, so in death we will cherish his memory, emulate his virtues and commend his high and sterling qualities.
III. That we extend to his bereaved family our heartfelt sympathy and condolence in their irreparable loss.
IV. That we request His Honor A. S. Seymour, the Judge presiding in this Court, to direct that these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of the Court and that the Secretaries send a copy of the same to the family of the deceased and to the *Wilmington Journal*, *Star and Review* and to the *Goldboro Messenger and Mail* with request to publish the same.

Pending the motion to adopt many kind and appropriate remarks were made by brethren Ricard, Galloway, Stanford, and Stallings. All agreed in speaking of him as possessing an intellect of high order, mysteriously blending greatness of mind with magnanimity of soul, thus constituting a useful and true man and faithful friend. But it was not alone in the quiet of his profession that his talents shone with resplendent lustre. When the tocsin of grim-visaged war was sounded, he was no sluggard, but like a gallant soldier he buckled on his armor and bravely met his country's foes in the front rank. Indeed, in every relation of life he seems to have been a model and a pattern-kind, genial, faithful, talented, a true man.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted by the members rising from their seats, after which the meeting adjourned.
