 in this city.

### No Address this Year.

We are sorry to learn that Hon. A. M.  
 Waddell has been suddenly called from  
 the city for attention to important busi-  
 ness matters and that therefore he will  
 be unable to deliver the address at the  
 Opera House on Thursday evening, at the  
 Commencement Exercises of the Cape  
 Fear Military Academy. As it is too late  
 to replace Col. Waddell there will be no  
 address this year although the regular ex-  
 aminations will be conducted at the  
 Academy.

### The Spartanburg Route.

Col. Pope announces elsewhere in this  
 issue that, commencing on the 15th inst.,  
 a perfect and continuous schedule will be  
 operated between this city and Western  
 North Carolina, via the new and attractive  
 Spartanburg route. By this route Ashe-  
 ville is brought within twenty-four  
 hours of Wilmington, parties,  
 leaving this city at 10:13 p. m.,  
 by sleeping car to Columbia  
 and arriving at Asheville at 10:20 the  
 next night. Close connections are also  
 made with all points North of this city.  
 Applications for accommodations may be  
 made at Col. Pope's office in this city or  
 of the Agents at points named in the ad-  
 vertisement. Excursion tickets are sold,  
 be it understood, good until next Novem-  
 ber.

### The Wilmington Light Infantry and their Old Armory.

The Wilmington Light Infantry, with  
 the consent of the City Authorities, took  
 possession of the Company's old armory in  
 the basement of the City Hall this morn-  
 ing and will hold their first drill  
 there on Thursday night.

The room above mentioned in the base-  
 ment of the City Hall building was given  
 to the W. L. I. before the war and by  
 this company at considerable expense  
 fitted up as an armory. Why a Demo-  
 cratic Administration should have been  
 so tardy in turning over the property is  
 beyond our comprehension. It is true  
 the company have no papers to prove their  
 property, but witnesses can be brought  
 forward who were connected with the  
 administration of municipal affairs to  
 prove that the authorities did confer or  
 convey this property in some way to the  
 above named military organization.

### City Court.

Tim Hamilton, colored, was arraigned  
 this morning for disorderly conduct. The  
 testimony of the officer who made the ar-  
 rest proved that the defendant was  
 making himself very obnoxious to per-  
 sons who were watching the race from  
 the wharf yesterday, even going so far as  
 to brush up against ladies, the Mayor  
 said \$10 fine or twenty days in the City  
 Prison. Tim went below.

Joseph Kelley, a white man who has  
 recently been discharged from the peni-  
 tentiary where he had been sent for the  
 attempted robbery of Messrs. Alex.  
 Sprunt & Son's office some year or so  
 ago, was arraigned for having indulged a  
 web bit too much and taken a few draps  
 too many of the cruther. The defend-  
 ant, however, made a very earnest ap-  
 peal to the Mayor, stating that if "Yer  
 Honor would excuse me I will lave th  
 town at once." The Mayor upon these  
 conditions released him with the under-  
 standing that his back must be upon the  
 town by 12 o'clock. A good riddance.

John Wright, colored, who was sim-  
 ply overcome with the heavy load of  
 liquids he was carrying last night, was  
 discharged in consequence of his having  
 committed no disturbance. This finished  
 the docket and the Court adjourned.

### The Yachts and their Races.

In looking over his books this morning,  
 Mr. Jno. J. Fowler, the Secretary of the  
 Carolina Yacht Club, informed us that since  
 June 15th, 1875, the *Ripple* has won the first  
 prize nine times, and the *Rosa* eight times.  
 On June 15th, 1875, the *Rosa* won the race  
 in the river, the *Little Walter* (now the  
*Restless*) coming out second, and the  
*Ripple* third. In the very next race, how-  
 ever, in July, the position of each boat  
 above mentioned was changed somewhat  
 at the end of the race, the *Little Walter*  
 coming out first, the *Ripple* second, and  
 the *Rosa* third.

The friends of the different boats, to  
 wit: the *Rosa*, *Ripple* and *Lizzie*, ex-  
 press much regret at the accidents which  
 befell them in the race yesterday, and, in  
 fact, it was a matter of universal regret  
 that any mishap should have occurred, and  
 particularly was it the occasion of regret  
 between the friends of the *Rosa* and the  
*Ripple*, as it was thought that yesterday  
 was a fair wind and tide to test the cap-  
 acity of the two rival boats just men-  
 tioned. But wait until next Monday week,  
 the 23d inst., and then you'll see, say our  
 jolly young tars of the different boats. "We'll  
 have our bobstays all right, and the right  
 sort of a man at the jib and main  
 sheets, so as not to haul too taut when we  
 want to luff up a little, and we'll have a  
 better man to tend the centre-board, and  
 then we'll come out three minutes ahead  
 of any other boat. You'll see, you bet!"  
 All right, gentlemen, we'll wait—you bet.

### Superior Court.

In the case of the City vs. Sol Bear,  
 His Honor decided in favor of the defend-  
 ant on account of informality and in-  
 sufficiency of the report of jury to assess  
 damages.

The case of the County Commissioners  
 against L. A. Hart, surety for ex-sheriff  
 J. W. Schenck, was tried this morning,  
 Mr. Solicitor Moore, of the Criminal  
 Court, prosecuting the case on the part  
 of the County Commissioners. It is  
 proper to state here, perhaps, that the de-  
 fendant in this case had made some settle-  
 ment with a previous Board of Commis-  
 sioners, but that the present Board deemed  
 it due to the county to sue for the balance  
 due the county by Schenck's defalcations.  
 The Judge reserved his decision.

The *quo warranto* case of S. P. Swain,  
 the defeated Republican candidate vs. M.  
 C. Guthrie, the Democratic incumbent  
 of Brunswick County, was again before  
 the court to-day. But we are free to con-  
 fess that we did not get into the merits of  
 the question, owing to the short time that  
 we were in the court room during the  
 discussion by counsel, and therefore can  
 only say that the Judge took the papers  
 in the case and reserved his decision.

### A Lively Chase.

Quite a lively chase was given a col-  
 ored man by the name of Wm. Wilson, this  
 morning, who escaped from a trial Jus-  
 tice's office, by officer Richardson, of the  
 Constabulary force. It seems that the  
 party above named was in custody at  
 J. C. Hill's office and asked permission  
 to step to the door to see a man, but in-  
 stead of stopping at the door kept on out  
 into the street, quickening his pace after  
 getting into the street into a pretty lively  
 run. Officer Richardson bolted after him  
 shouting, stop him! stop him! but nobody  
 stopped him, and on they sped, pursuer  
 and pursued, until two racers  
 who were on their mettle,  
 reached the confines of Paddy's Hollow  
 when strange to say, so we are informed,  
 a boy of about fifteen summers seizing a  
 large rock in his hand planted himself  
 right in front of the escaped prisoner, and  
 with the mighty missile raised threatened  
 the fugitive with vengeance dire and  
 commanded him to halt immediately,  
 whereupon the pursued man halted and  
 the officer coming up planted his right  
 hand in the prisoner's collar, told him to  
 "stop dat foolishness and come along"  
 and away they went, side by side back to  
 the high dignitary's office from which the  
 escape had just been made.

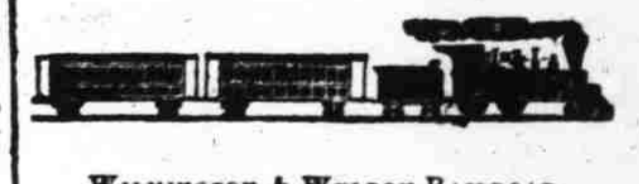
