From the Foochow Herald. a American Chapel in China Sacked. Ou Sunday, the 16th of February, a mob of over a hundred persons forciply entered the American Methodist Unaper at Yunch'un, 140 miles south of Fooebow, and violently assaulted the Caristians who had gathered therein for divine worship. The catechist and congregation escaped to the maglettate's jamen, leaving the mob in possession of the chapel. The rabble mmediately set to work and destroyed ibr seats, tables, &c. Previous to this attack he people had been called upon by the gentry to subscribe \$100 cash-avowedly toward the extermination of Christianity in their district. Iheir medus operandi was to tear down the chapel in the first instance of the christians-thus forcibly driving them out of the place. But happily, outy part of this programme was carried out. The sufferers by the riot fled to the magistrate's yamen, where they were kindly received and prom-
