A Novel Case.

Puncturing the place with a needle she became aware that some hard foreign substance was embedded there, and taking a sharp pen knife she made a sight incision from which she extracted a small piece of teel about one-eighthlof an inch in length From that day the noss began to heal until now the last vestige of the wart has disappeared and the organ has resumed its normal healthy appearance. The only solution we can give to the matter is, that a small fragment remained in the wound after the accident, and after traveling around and keeping up a continued annoyance, it at last settled where it was discovered and extracted as above stated
