### Death of Col. B. F. Little.

It is with sincere regret that we feel called upon to make the sad announcement of the death of Col. B. F. Little, which occurred at his residence at Little's Mills, in Richmond, his native county, on Sunday last, the 27th inst. Col. Little has many friends and acquaintances in this city, who will hear with unfeigned sorrow of his sudden departure from this life. The painful rumor of the death of this gallant gentleman was in circulation upon the streets here yesterday afternoon, but it was only a rumor, and no one thought it to be true; or, at least, all hoped it not to be true. But by the *Charlotte Observer* which reached here this morning, we find that the rumor is only too true. From the *Observer* we make the following extract concerning the deceased gentleman:

The subject of this notice receiving an excellent education, and growing into manhood, adopted the life of a planter and was married to a daughter of the late Rufus Reid, Esq., of Iredell. The war coming on he entered the Confederate army and served with distinguished bravery, losing an arm which rendered necessary his retirement from active military service. Since that time his health has been at all times delicate. In the year 1864 he served a term in the Legislature; in 1875 he was offered the nomination of the Democratic party of his county to a seat in the State convention that year, and in 1876 he was one of the delegates from this congressional district to the National Democratic convention which met that year at St. Louis and nominated Mr. Tilden for President. This has been the extent of his connection with public affairs, for which he never developed a taste. Benevolence and charity were leading traits in his character and he was ever foremost in every good word and work.
