His Honor Mayor Fishplate departs this city by the early morning train tomorrow for Long Branch, where he expects to lie off "in the cool" and recuperate for a few weeks.

On a Leave of Absence.

The boat came down this morning in charge of the engineer, who will probably remain in command during the Captain's absence. Joint Meeting.
At a joint meeting of the County Commissioners and Magistrates of Brunswick county, held on Monday last, the following tax was levied:
For general expenses of the county government, 84 1/2 cents on the \$100. On each poll \$1.25. Both levies being a reduction from last year.

The matter of putting a draw in the Town Creek bridge was laid over until the next meeting of the Commissioners for action.
The bill for the clothing purchased for the man Jack Davis who was hung last month was repudiated on the ground that it was too high and not authorized by the county.

A New Postal Regulation.
The custom of postmasters of guessing at the destination of misdirected letters, and forwarding them in accordance with their guesses, has caused, in many instances, annoyance to correspondents and loss of time in correspondence. The subject has been under consideration at the postoffice department. A letter has been prepared advising that postmasters be instructed to discontinue the custom. It is held that when the postmaster has knowledge which makes him certain of the true destination of the letter, he should forward it. In other cases of unmistakably misdirected letters, when it is plain that they are intended to go to some other city than the one reached, they should be sent immediately to the dead letter office, or, if the necessary information is upon the envelope, be returned to the sender.

City Court.
Juo Brodie, colored, for disorderly conduct, submitted and paid the cost.
Mary E. Thompson, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was fined \$5 and costs or ten days in the city prison. She went to the berth below.
Wm. Heide, Davis Matten, Abram Bell, Henry Smith, and Alpheus Dennis, five white sailors, were arrested last night by officers Nelson, Woebse and Teitgen and arraigned this morning for disorderly conduct, such as loud and boisterous swearing and cursing and abusing the police in the neighborhood of Paddy's Hollow.

It appearing in the evidence that the first named prisoner was not guilty, he was discharged. Alpheus Dennis being found more guilty than the others was required to pay a fine of \$20 or go below for thirty days.
The three remaining defendants, Davis, Matten, Abram Bell and Henry Smith were sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 each or given the alternative of going to the C. P. for thirty days. They all went below.

The case of Lewis Green, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was again continued on account of sickness of the defendant. This wound up the proceedings for the day, and His Honor stepped down and out with a smile of relief at the prospect of a three weeks holiday, which he enters upon to-morrow.

Quarterly Meeting.
The third Quarterly Meeting for the Topsail circuit, Methodist E. Church South, will be held at Herring's Chapel on Saturday and Sunday, the 9th and 10th instant, and the ensuing Monday a meeting of several days' continuance will commence at the Methodist Church at Rocky Point. The Presiding Elder of the District, Rev. Dr. Burkhead, will be in attendance at both places.

Indisposed.
We regret to learn that Mr. Alex Sprunt, the British Vice Consul for this port, is confined to his house from a severe attack of sickness. Captain F. G. Robinson, we are sorry to learn, is also severely sick at his residence in this city. We trust that both of these much esteemed gentlemen will soon be able to report for duty again, and their pleasant faces be once more visible at their accustomed places of business.

At the Rock Quarry.
Peace and good order seem to prevail now among the colored laborers at the Rock Quarry, near Rocky Point, on the North East river. This is probably the result, to a great extent, of the strong measures adopted some months ago by certain members of the gang. They had their own committees, a judge and a sheriff, and any one of the laborers caught stealing from another was soon detected, well trussed, and then turned loose to go and work somewhere else. There are now about five hundred hands employed there and among them many desperate characters, and yet good order and a comparative degree of honesty, at least in so far as regards the goods and chattels of a fellow-laborer, are now maintained among them.

Criminal Court.
Shortly after Court was commenced this morning the State vs H. Schriver, charged with murder, was called.
The defendant was arraigned and the trial, by consent of Mr. Solicitor Moore, on the part of the State, and the defendant's counsel, M. Bellamy Esq., was set for Friday at 9 o'clock.
The regular docket was then taken up as follows:
State vs Roxanna Hunter, charged with assault; verdict not guilty.
State vs James Capot, charged with trespass; verdict guilty; motion made in arrest of judgment.

The Crops
We are glad to hear such good reports in regard to the crops as reach us from all quarters. A week ago everything seemed to be at the last gasp for the want of rain, and the heart of the farmer was but a stronghold for gloomy forebodings. Now that copious rains have fallen, all this is changed, and the planters hereabouts are talking very hopefully. We have heard to-day from the section touching on Castle Hayne, and it is now thought that an average crop will be the result there, while at Rocky Point, Point Caswell and other portions of Pender county, not less than two thirds, and probably three-fourths, of a full crop is counted on. One or two more good rains is all that is needed to ensure these happy anticipations.

A Needed Reconstruction.
If Mr. Chairman Smith and his coadjutors on the Board of County Commissioners don't speedily have the ventilation of the County Court House room reconstructed entirely, the county will in our judgment have a numerous amount of funeral expenses, mourning and other expenses incident thereto, such as medicines and so forth, to pay out. For the vast majority of the people who attend in the Criminal Court, as is well known to the gentlemen of the Board of Commissioners, are of a class who are neither able to pay doctors' bills or burial expenses and the foul air that is breathed in the Court House is enough to generate disease among every one who attends upon the Court sessions. Besides as an act of justice to the officers of the Court, but more particularly to Major Dunham, the gentlemanly and obliging clerk who has to stand in a perfect sweat box all day, we think some change in the arrangement ought to be made. The members of the Bar have dropped off right rapidly in the past two or three years; who can tell but that the atmosphere in a crowded court room where the ventilation is bad had something to do with it? Such was the cause attributed to the very great fatality that existed among the Congressmen of the United States at Washington last year—bad ventilation of their respective chambers, and we think they applied a remedy immediately.

An Ordinance
Relating to Cattle Running at Large.
ORDERED, That all persons are hereby prohibited from allowing their Cows, or other cattle beasts, to run at large within the city limits, and all Cows and other cattle beasts found running at large in violation of the Ordinance shall be impounded by the Chief of Police and advertised, and the owners may redeem and recover the same, upon paying a fine of Two and One half dollars and all expenses of impounding, advertising and feeding the said Cows or other cattle beasts.
The above Ordinance was passed by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting held August 4th, 1879, and will go into effect on and after the 15th inst.
