## Harbor Master's Report.

Capt. Price, Harbor Master at this port, makes the following report for the month of August: 3 steamers, 7 schooners, and 1 brig, a total of 11 American vessels, with a tonnage of 4,356, and 6 barques and 2 brigs, a total of 8 foreign vessels, with a tonnage of 2,528 arrived during the month. The total arrivals during the month were 19 and the total tonnage 6,884 which is an unusually small showing.

## The Telephone.

An Edison telephone has been erected at Flemington and persons now converse between this city and the Lake. We do not know whether it is to be a permanent thing or only to be used as long as the Wilmingtonians remain in Flemington.

By this same telephone a gentleman who was sick at Flemington last night received a prescription from a physician in this city and a conversation was carried on with all ease between Flemington and Masorboro Sound.

## City Court.

The case continued from yesterday, in which the defendant pleaded previous conviction before a Magistrate, was again called this morning and after giving the witnesses in the case a hearing the Mayor imposed a fine of \$10 upon the defendant.

A remarkable looking colored man was arraigned for being drunk and down, but proved such an unexceptionable good character that the case was dismissed and the party released.

## Yearly Review.

The *Charleston News & Courier* published on Monday a very interesting resume of the business of that port during the past twelve months. It is a very extensive report and embraces every department of business enterprise. It seems to have been very carefully compiled and the exhibit it makes is a flattering one.

We also find a lengthy report in the *Charlotte Observer* as to the operations in that prosperous little city during the past twelve months which we may refer to more at length hereafter.

## Low Water in the Cape Fear.

The steamer *D. Murchison*, which left Fayetteville at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, did not reach here until 10 a. m. today, being detained by low water on the shoals. She was due at 2 o'clock this morning and was eight hours behind time. Until there is a raise in the river the steamers will be compelled to rely upon the use of flats to lighter them over the shoals. There have been rains reported on the Cape Fear above Fayetteville, but as yet they have made no perceptible increase in the depth of water.

## Theatrical Season.

The indications for a fine theatrical season are good. So far the following engagements have been made for the Opera House: Ford's Juvenile Opera Troupe, Ada Richmond, John A. Stevens, in *River Mystery*, Frank Frayne, W. J. Florence, in *Mighty Dollar*, Madame Rentz' Female Minstrels, Joe Jefferson, Milton Nobles, Lawrence Barrett, Joseph Murphy, and Buffalo Bill. Ford's Troupe plays October 2nd, the next being Ada Richmond, October 20th and 21st. Inquiries for the Opera House have been made and it is pleasing to know that we will be visited by a good class of troupes during the coming season.

Mr. L. M. Williams, our efficient Clerk of the Market, has so far recovered from his recent attack of sickness as to appear upon the streets.

The storm signal disports itself to-day. It was ordered up last night, for the first time since it gave warning, two days in advance, of the recent terrible storm.

## Agricultural Report.

We have received the "Annual Report of the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station for 1879." The work comprises about 200 pages and is compiled by Prof. A. R. Ledoux, the State Chemist, by direction of the State Board of Agriculture. The book shows the workings of the experiment station at Chapel Hill, which is under the immediate supervision of Prof. Ledoux. It contains many valuable formulas for fertilizers, indicating those which are best for special crops. This is the first annual report, and it is a source of pride to think that the entire work is in all its completeness a North Carolina production, and even the paper upon which it is printed was manufactured within the confines of the State.

## Sacredness of Sealed Communications.

In a matter involving the question whether a postmaster is required under the law to testify in a judicial proceeding who rents a box in his office, who took the letters from it, etc., tending to show what became of certain correspondence, the subject was referred to Assistant Attorney-General Freeman, of the post office department, and he has advised the postmaster-general that the postmaster should not be required to answer the inquiries. He says: 'The postmaster is an agent of the government, and there is no relation which the government sustains towards the people of such high trust and of such peculiar and confidential character as that which it sustains in the transmission of sealed communications. The name of the person addressed is written on the outside of the letter for one purpose alone, that of enabling the postmaster to deliver it to the proper person. For any other purpose the postmaster is presumed to have no knowledge of the address.'

## To Ex-Confederates.

A gallant soldier of the late Confederate army has just fallen a victim to the terrible scourge of yellow fever in the city of New Orleans. He has been smitten by the fell destroyer and now sleeps in a quiet tomb near the Crescent City. The wife of his bosom was a victim to the same disease and preceded her husband only a few days on the long journey to the eternal shore. But behind them both is a family of ten helpless little children, now bereft of father and mother, and left to the cold charities of the world for support and sustenance. The brave soldier to whom we refer, as the reader, no doubt, already surmises is none other than the gallant General Hood, who, we understand, died penniless, and without anything to bequeath to his children, except his untarnished honor as a soldier, and his integrity of character as a man, both priceless boons it is true, and a legacy which the orphan children will be proud to inherit from their lamented father. But while this crippled and maimed soldier has left nothing but a good name and fair fame to his little ones, cannot the thousands of surviving Confederate soldiers in North Carolina contribute something as a testimonial of appreciation of this departed hero, to the support of the orphans? Let a subscription fund be started in Wilmington, and let every Confederate soldier give not less than twenty-five or fifty cents, and as much more as he pleases, and we trust, if a like example is followed in the other Southern States, there will soon be a sufficient fund raised to place the little ones above and beyond want.
