

Agricultural Report.

We have received the "Annual Report of the North Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station for 1879." The work comprises about 200 pages and is compiled by Prof. A. R. Ledoux, the State Chemist, by direction of the State Board of Agriculture. /The book shows the workings of the experiment station at Chapel Hill, which is under toppage 6.884 which is an unusually the immediate supervision of Prof. people of the country surrounding the Ledoux. /It contains many valuable formulas for fertilizers, indicating those which are best for special crops.
