Orange Citron.
Candied orange peel or orange citron is easily made. The only difficulty is to obtain the orange with thick enough peel, the thicker the better. Soak the peel in salt and water a day and night, then freshen for the same length of time; make a syrup of sugar, using a pound to each pound of peel, and boil until nearly transparent.

Death of a Coasting Captain.
The flags of the small coasters that are in this port have been at half mast to day out of respect to the memory of Captain C. D. Kennedy, the former Captain of the schooner *Maggie*, who died in this city at 3 o'clock this morning, of consumption. The remains have been taken to Jacksonville, Onslow county, for interment.

An Extra Steamer.
The steamer *Tybee*, Captain Tribon from New York arrived in this city to-day consigned to Mr. Thos. E. Bond Superintendent of the New York and Wilmington Steamship Line. The *Tybee* was put on the line in connection with the steamers, *Benefactor* and *Regulator* until the Southern bound freights in New York can be cleared away. Southern merchants have been purchasing very largely in New York this season hence the rush of freights.

Robbery Aboard Ship.
Capt. J. E. Atchison's bunk aboard his barge *James E. Ward*, now unloading in front of the Custom House, was robbed on Monday night of a pocket book containing valuable papers and some money. The robbery took place about the time of the desertion of two seamen and they were thought to be the thieves. One of them was arrested but nothing leading to his guilt could be established and he was released. As yet neither book nor papers have been recovered. Capt. Atchison thinks that the book was extracted from his bunk by the thief running his arm through the port hole.

Tragedy in Lumberton Jail.
We learn from the last number of the *Robesonian* that Peter Leach, colored, who is confined in jail at Lumberton to await his trial for the murder of Sam Townsend, was taken suddenly and seriously ill last Saturday night. Physicians were called who after a careful examination of the sufferer, came to the conclusion that he had been poisoned. Suspicion was at once directed to his wife as the guilty party, as she had been in the habit of visiting the jail and bringing him food, and had done so on the day he was taken sick. It was on account of alleged intimacy with her that Townsend was killed and as she has taken up with another man since Peter's incarceration the presumption is that she has been actuated by a desire to get rid of him without awaiting for the uncertainty of the law's delay. She has been arrested, and states that one Joshua Washington was the man who gave her the cakes she carried to Peter.
