Sudden Death.

We regret to learn of the sudden death on yesterday of Mrs. Mary E. Westbrook, consort of Mr. A. J. Westbrook, of Rock Point, Pender county. The deceased lady was very nearly seventy years of age and for some time past has been suffering from an aberration of the mind, and on Tuesday while still suffering from this mental disorder took an opiate which resulted in her death. She leaves a large and respected family to mourn her sad and sudden end.

Slightly Hurt.

This morning James Bradley, a colored drayman, while bringing a wooden mantelpiece on his shoulder down a pair of steps leading from Messrs. Altafer & Price's factory, missed his footing and fell to the ground, the mantelpiece striking him on the head and in the groin. Bradley was picked up insensible and carried to an office in the lumber yard of Messrs. Colville & Co.'s mill. Medical attendance was soon at hand and it was ascertained that the injured man was not as severely hurt as was at first thought. He soon revived and complained very much of a pain in his side.

Severe Storm in Anson.

We learn from the *Wadesboro Herald* the following particulars of a severe storm which recently visited that section. The *Herald* says:

On Monday afternoon, at about 5 o'clock, we had a very heavy storm of wind and rain, but no serious damage was done, more than the prostration of fences, etc., in this immediate vicinity.

At Ansonville large trees were blown down, but the main force of the storm commenced at a point about one and a half miles northeast of Wadesboro—at the plantation of Atlas Jowers—where fences were leveled. The fences, many trees, and several out-houses on Wm. Garris' plantation were destroyed—also his buggy. John Williams, on the adjoining farm, also lost heavily. He and his wife were standing in the passage of his house and were blown out, some distance from the house.

We learn that the storm caused great devastation on Dr. W. H. Battle's plantation, near Lilesville—blowing down many of those sturdy oaks about the yard near his dwelling, and leveling all his fences. There are reports of much damage about Lilesville.

We also learn that a great deal of hail fell in the northern portion of the county during the prevalence of the storm, doing great damage to cotton, etc.

James. But upon reaching the Hall, Captain Brock, Chief of Police learned that a warrant had already been issued by Justice Millis for the arrest of the parties, and they were consequently released from the custody of the city officer and immediately arrested by a constable who cited them to appear at Justice Millis' Court at 8 o'clock this afternoon for trial.
